CRESCENT BEACH, B. C., April 18.—Indian bones, believed by Professor Charles Hill-Tout, Vancouver anthropologist, to be at least 300 years old, were discovered under a burial mound on the grounds of a summer home here. The bones, with remains of a crudely-fashioned cedar coffin, were dug up by boys as they lunched off the grass-covered mound near the summer resort, 30 miles southeast of Vancouver.

Financial Bulletins

JAMAICA PUBLIC SERVICE

For the year ended December 31st, 1938, the Company reports consolidated net income of \$194,882 after all charges, including preferred dividend provisions, equal to \$3.14 per common share. This compares with \$179,688 for 1937 or \$2.80 per share. The balance sheet shows net working capital at \$352,965 vs \$510,642 a year ago, the reduction being mainly a decline in cash from \$271,590 to \$134,983. Property account on the other hand rose from \$4,284,785 to \$4,379,246 during the period.

MACASSA MINES

The Company reports a net profit of \$244,506 for the three months ended March 31st, equal to 9.12c per share. This compares with \$152,807 or 5.7c a share reported for the same period a year ago. Gross value of production at \$564,882 compares with \$388,454 a year ago. The net profit in the final quarter of 1938 was shown at \$231,733.

FRANCOEUR GOLD

The Company, during 1938, shows a net loss of \$4,796. The balance sheet shows current assets of \$81,649 and current liabilities of \$149,337. Production from August 1st to December 31st, 1938 totalled \$122,088 derived from the milling of 22,299 tons indicating an average recovery per ton of \$5.47. At the year-end the broken ore in stones totalled 25,810 tons.

RONDA GOLD

Shareholders of the Company will be asked at a special meeting to be held April 25th, to change the present 3,500,000 shares of \$1.00 par value, to no par value, and to increase capitalization to 3,750,000 shares by the creation of 250,000 preferred shares of \$1.00 par value. The preferred shares to be entitled to a fixed cumulative preferred dividend of 6% per annum, together with 35% of the profits left after paying such dividends, and to be redeemable at \$1.10 per share after three years. Due to unavoidable delays, production at the mine did not start until the 30th of January. Upon commencement of milling, an unexpected dilution problem was encountered. This condition results in the Company obtaining substantially less from production than has been originally estimated. These problems have created liabilities which must be taken care of. It is felt that additional development work will remedy the problem.

LOBLAW GROCETERIAS

The Company declared an extra dividend of 12½¢ and the regular quarterly dividend of 25¢ per share on the Class "A" and "B" stock, both payable June 1st to shareholders of record May 10th.

DUKE'S GUESTS FINGERPRINTED

LONDON, April 19.—Guests of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough at Blenheim Palace had their fingerprints taken as a precautionary measure when it was discovered that miniature, medallions and other family treasures had been stolen early this week.

Even the Duke and Duchess and three of their children, the Marquess of Blandford, Lady Sarah Spencer-Churchill and Lady Caroline Spencer-Churchill, had their fingerprints taken.

Photographic experts recorded prints left on woodwork and glass-topped cases. The drawers of tables and cabinets were taken away for examination.

The haul comprised chiefly of jewel-encrusted miniatures, but the thief also included in his bag a snuff box and silver gilt spoons which were part of the campaign equipment of the first Duke of Marlborough, and a gold Louis XV snuff box.

CLAIMED LAND FOR UNITED STATES

MONTREAL, April 19. — After dodging icebergs for three months in the Antarctic with the Lincoln-Ellsworth expedition, Group-Captain James H. Lymburner, in charge of the flying units, reached Montreal by train from Halifax. Icebergs had kept him from sailing up the St. Lawrence in the Montcalm, which had to change its course off Cape Race and make for Halifax.

Describing the expedition as highly successful, this Ontario-born pilot told reporters how, when flying over an 83,000 square mile stretch of land in the Australian sector of the Antarctic they had flung overboard from their plane a metal cylinder containing a scrap of paper claiming all the territory they had sighted, for the United States.

U.S. WILL SEND EXPEDITIONS TO CLAIM LAND

WASHINGTON, April 19 — The United States, it was learned today, is planning to send a Government expedition to the South Pole regions to "nail-down" American claims to potential resources for which an international race is developing.

Rear-Admiral Richard E. Byrd, who led two expeditions and claimed vast areas for the United States, has been called in for consultations with other experts on the region. At the present stage of the plan, however, it was uncertain whether Byrd would head the proposed expedition.

Under tentative plans, the expedition would be authorized by Congress and financed by a Congressional appropriation.

STONINGTON, Conn., April 19. — John J. Donahue never was superstitious about walking under ladders until the day he inspected the new high school.

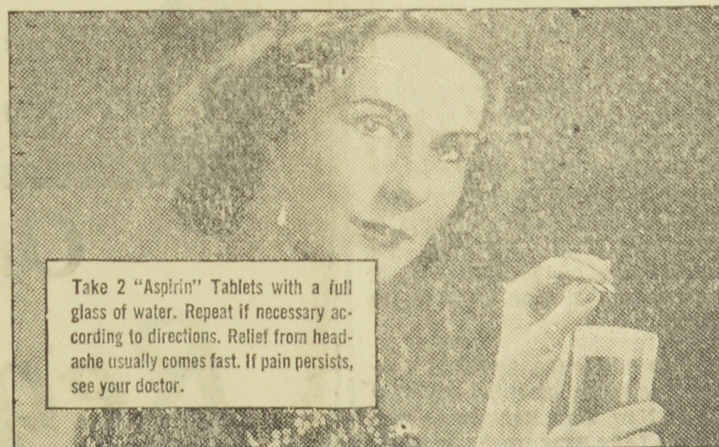

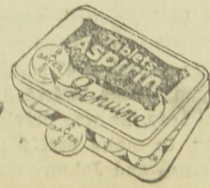

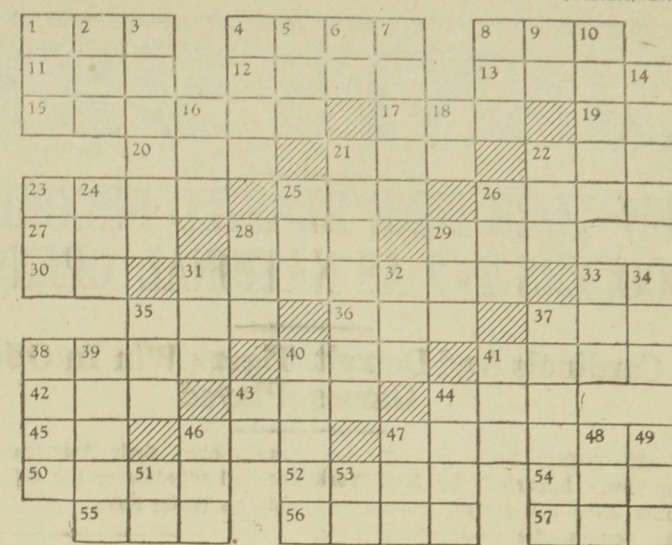
