**Resigns Faculty
U.N.B. For Ministry**

Professor of French and German
languages at the University of New
Brunswick since 1926, Robert Pugh,
M.A. (Oxon) has tendered his re-
signation to the university senate,
and in the coming fall will enter the
University of King's College, Hal-
ifax, as a student of Theology to en-
ter the ministry.

In the twelve years Prof. Pugh has
been associated with the university,
he has been active with the Boy
Scout and Wolf Cub movement and
is Provincial Field Worker of the
Scout Association for New Brun-
swick. For the past six years he has
been assistant provincial commis-
sioner. He has been responsible for
the extension of the movement in
the province and the formation of
many new groups.

In Fredericton he has been con-
nected with the Cathedral Wolf Cub
pack and is a former district Cub
commissioner and Akela leader. Pro-
fessor Pugh is qualified to give Gil-
well courses in Wolf Cub, Scout and
Rover Scout work in both French
and English. He is the only person
in Canada so qualified.

A gifted musician, Professor Pugh
has supplied as organist in Christ-
church Cathedral and other churches
in this city.
