

CAPS TAKE LEAD IN SOUTHERN LEAGUE

LIFFORDMEN TAG 2-0 SHUTOUT ON SUSSEX TEAM IN GAME HERE TO GRAB TOP SPOT BY 2 PT. MARGIN

Morehouse and Haining Sagged the Sussex Twines For Only Markers of Game—Fast and High Calibre Hockey — A Good Sized Crowd on Hand.

Fredericton Capitals blanketed the Sussex Rovers last night on local ice with a 2-0 count to sever the three team deadlock for first place in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League.

Evenly matched, both teams gave the good sized crowd its money's worth in battling hockey. Although ragged and slow during part of the first stanza, the play brightened in the second and third heats. By Staples, Capitals' net janitor, saved the battle for the locals after the first count, brushing aside a fusillade of Rover goal shots in the visitors' desperate attempt to tie the mark.

Gets Opener

In the first verse Sussex forced the play, although the locals took their first count in the last third of the period. Keenan skated the puck inside the Rovers' blue line and shot a hard one to Spears. Sussex twine tender, Morehouse skated in on the rebound and slapped back the disc hard into the left corner of the net.

Two minutes before the first period was finished Ron Laskey was sent to the dog house for knee checking McNeill, Rover redheaded defenseman. During Laskey's time in the cooler the visiting team pounded the local line five men up but couldn't get within Staples' defense.

Local teamwork showed better in the second frame although shooting still held off. Manny McIntyre and Laskey got through the Rovers' lone defenseman but Laskey's shot went wild 10 feet from the net.

Near the end of the second, Staples was bombarded with another desperate bid for visitors' tying the score. Losing his stick in the wild melee of sticks and players, he went to his knees to clear the puck. Manny McIntyre filled the gap in the cage until Staples cleared the danger zone. Staples stopped at least one hard shot with his glove before the Caps took the play down the ice.

Laskey went into the cooler again in the third for tripping Kennedy. Five men up again, Sussex forced the pace for a while. The locals' defense held, however, and the aggressors were held off until Laskey returned to the ice.

About half way through the last stanza Bill and Manny McIntyre took the puck into Sussex-land. Manny bounced a hard one off Spear's arm. Haining following through caught the disc and slammed it past the visiting net janitor just before falling flat on the ice.

The visiting aggregation played all hands up for the rest of the game in a last desperate attempt to mark a counter. The locals played a defensive game with an occasional sally up the ice. Staples made some more spectacular saves in the dying minutes of the battle.

WILF CUDE GETS SHUTOUT OVER MIGHTY BRUINS

Canadiens Down Boston 1-0; Wings Take N. Y. Rangers

MONTREAL, Jan. 20.—A battered Wilf Cude, injured in the second period, made a spectacular return to top goal-tending form last night to kick out shot after shot and goal Montreal's last place Canadiens to a 1-0 National Hockey League victory over the league's leading Boston Bruins.

Wm Cude, replaced once earlier in the season by Claude Bourque because of an attack of "jitters" in top form, Canadiens gained their second shut-out of the season over the mighty Bruins on a second period goal by Johnny Gagnon while Flash Hollett was serving a penalty incurred just one second from the end of the first period.

It was the fourth time this season that the Bruins have been shut out, Canadiens turning the trick 2-0 once before on Montreal ice when Frankie Brimsek made his debut as regular goalie for the Bruins after sale of Cecil Thompson to Detroit Red Wings.

Brimsek co-leader with Turk Broda of Toronto in the matter of shutouts with six, was brilliant in holding the Flying Frenchmen to Gagnon's lone goal, which came on a long shot after a passing play with Tom Blake and Babe Siebert.

At least three times in the last period he saved what looked like certain goals, robbing Blake twice and stopping a dead-on five footer from Bill Summerhill on a breakaway.

Cude suffered a gashed forehead when he dropped in front of his net to smother a shot. The cut required three stitches and the game was held up 10 minutes while he received medical attention.

Wings Edge Rangers
DETROIT, Jan. 20.—Rookie Roy Griesbrecht thrust home a last-period goal against New York Rangers that gave Detroit Red Wings a 4-3 victory last night and pulled them up into a fifth-place tie with Chicago Black Hawks in the National Hockey League standing.

Two Ton Tony Wins Fight by First Heat K. O.
NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 20.—Two-ton Tony Galento beat Joe Louis' record for the Jorge Brescia distance last night, flattening the tall Argentine in one round before a crowd of 9,087 fans in the big Newark armory.

Galento scaled 235 to Brescia's 216 pounds.
Tangling with the South American who lasted three rounds with Louis some time back, the pudgy pounder from Jersey dashed in with the bell, dropped Brescia once for a one-count with a left hook to the body and then put him away for keeps with half a dozen more of the same southpaw shots to the tummy.
Groaning and grimacing in pain, as he clutched his stomach, Brescia was on his knees as he was counted out by referee Whitey Healey.
Two-ton Tony meantime, confident his night's work was over, leaned against the ropes and waved to cheering pals.

Change of Style Blamed For Pitcher's Sore Arms

NEW YORK, N. Y., January 20.—"The Yankees' Special" was roaring home from Chicago. The players' hair was still wet from their happy shower baths after the rout of Dizzy Dean in the second game of the 1938 World Series.

"Poor old Dizzy Dean", someone took time out from his joy to sigh. "A great pitcher even with a lame arm."

"Yep", a scribe remarked, "Old Diz tried to forget he had a lame wing, just like Hal Schumacher did last this season, but his arm went back on him just like Hubbell's, Mungo's, Bridges', Grissom's and Lloyd Moore's."

"And Ferrell's Allen's and Carleton's and a flock of others, including Grove's", filled in another.

"What's the matter with everybody, coming up with sore arms like this?" the writer put squarely up to Earle V. (Doc) Painter, the trainer of the world's champions.

CASES VARY
"Well", exclaimed Doc, "every case isn't the same, you know, just like men get bald-headed for various reasons. Some fellows lose their hair, evidently because it's hereditary; others from poor health or scalp ailments."

USE NEW MUSCLES
Painter's explanation certainly sounded logical. Some of the pitchers didn't start changing their styles knowingly, but in nursing lame arms they inadvertently shifted the strain while easing up, thus bringing unnatural muscles into play.

The old-fashioned way to cure a sore arm is to run the pitcher in the outfield after fungoes in practice. Frank (Pancho) Snyder, the Giants' coach, explains that sore arms are traced to lack of condition.

"When a pitcher is a little too fat or a bit out of shape he tires in the box and starts to pitch in an unnatural way. First thing you know, his arm is sore. When one of our boys gets a sore arm we immediately chase him around in the outfield. After a few days he has his wind and can pitch naturally. With his muscles acting normally his arm is not strained."

SERIOUS ITEM
Frank Shaughnessy had something to say on the subject last summer over a platter of ham and eggs en route to the All-Star game in Cincinnati.

"This sore arm business is getting to be one of the serious items of baseball", spoke the head of the International League. "Any number of strong young chaps in our league are complaining about lame wings. Some of them may be true cases, but most of them are imagined. At the slightest twinge some young pitchers conjure up visions of sore arms like Dean's, Mungo's or Ferrell's and they crawl into their shell."

If everybody followed Doc Painter's suggestion and took care not to change his style of delivery, the chances are that all arms would last off a ripe old career.

BOB PASTOR GETS NOD OVER WARRINGTON

BOSTON, Jan. 20.—Bob Pastor, young New York heavyweight, out-slugged stubborn Tiger Terry Warrington, of Liverpool, N. S., Canadian heavyweight and light-heavyweight champion for a unanimous decision in a bruising 10-round bout last night at Mechanics Building.

Pastor weighed 182 1-4 and Warrington 176 1-2.

Pastor forced the issue from start to finish but the Nova Scotian Negro displayed an airtight defence during the early rounds and forced the New Yorker to miss frequently.

During the third session, Pastor, while trying to work on his rival's body, was nipped by a stinging right that opened a slight cut under his eye. The Negro improved in every round up through the fifth, which he carried by scoring with a series of long lefts and rights to the head.

In the following frame, however, Pastor discovered the opening he was seeking and during the remainder of the battle he concentrated on Warrington's body and inflicted heavy damage, especially with a short right hook to the ribs.

U.N.B. CAGERS TO WOODSTOCK

The University of New Brunswick basketball team will play its first game away from home at Woodstock tonight, meeting the Woodstock Senators in the armories and the Rick-er Classical Institute Saturday night at Houlton. Coach George Andrews stated today he will carry the same players he has been using in exhibition games against the Community Y team.

McAvoy to Start New Ring Campaign

NEW YORK, N. Y., January 20.—Jock McAvoy has announced his intention of invading the "States" once more to have a fling among the middleweights. Jock still can make the weight, according to American managers who have lately come from London.

Jock held both the middle and light heavyweight titles in England at one time and his hard hitting makes him dangerous every time he comes to the center. Whether he is the same capable fighter that he was when he sent Babe Risko sprawling in Madison Square Garden remains to be seen. That night he flattened Risko in an over the weight match and, of course, didn't win the world's middleweight crown which rested on Risko's dome at the time.

UP POPS MR. THIL

McAvoy whipped everybody in sight on his side of the Atlantic until he ran afoul of Marcel Thil, the man who really held the world's title when he came here to fight Fred Apostoli. The New York boxing board suddenly decided that Fred and Marcel were not fighting for world honors after having sanctioned the bout as one of four title affairs which went to make up the "Carnival of Champions".

Thil, of course, will never again appear as a middleweight, if ever he fights at all. He has seen his best day and has grown heavy, from all accounts. He was a real champion when at his best and sent back the best in the world when they invaded his domain, winning twice from Lou Brouillard and knocking

out Gorilla Jones, who went to France hearing the world's title.

FEBRUARY GO LOOMS
That's just where Thil clinched his claim on the crown, and the best reason that Fred Apostoli has a better claim on the 160-pound tiara than Solly Krieger who at best, merely outpointed an American champion in Al Hostak.

Apostoli, in the second of two fights with Krieger, stopped the N. B. A. champion.

The chances are that Apostoli and Krieger will get down to the business of settling the argument once and for all around the end of February or the early part of March.

Right now Krieger is busy harrastorming, but will have to lay off for a spell because of his hands, which he hurt in the Hostak bout and which have not had the proper rest ever since.
