

# ROY BURTT IS CITY BOWLING CHAMP

## Tops Veteran John King In Last Minute Rally

Also Won High Three String Honors With 413 While Willard Kitchen Had Single Hlgh String With 161. Tournament Team To Be Picked Within Week or Two.

With sixty-seven members participating, the City Bowling League, sponsored by the Fredericton Bowling Club, completed another of its successful seasons last week on Palace Alleys.

Topping the high average men was Roy Burtt, who, with but several games to go set a remarkable pace to pass the veteran Johnny King and attain the honor of leading the League. To Burtt also went the honor of marking up the high three string record of 413. Next in order of standing were Johnny King, Hush Peterson, Willard Kitchen, Stan Horncastle, Gerald Cormier, Harold Jewett, A. G. Tracey, George Howell and Gerald Higgins.

Some of the major highlights of the league were the high single string record of 161 made by Willard Kitchen; the high three string record of 413 rolled by Roy Burtt to best the previous mark of 389 made by George Howell; the high single team record set up by the Cubs and the high three team record of 1695 put on by the Community Y five.

The Capitals led by Johnny King won first place in the team standing followed closely by the Imperials, Bees and Y.M.H.A. These four teams will meet in a playoff series to determine the champions of the League.

## 1200 MEN SEEK AIR FORCE JOBS AT MONTREAL

MONTREAL, April 24. — Approximately 1,200 Montreal men of various degrees of skill have registered at Headquarters of Military District No. 4 here during the past three weeks. Squadron Leader E. A. McGowan, R. C. A. F., disclosed.

Some three weeks ago the Royal Canadian Air Force advertised in the local press for skilled tradesmen desirous of enlisting in the non-flying branch of the Air Force, and the response was immediate and overwhelming, more than 500 applications being received within three days of the appearance of the notice.

Only a very small proportion of the large number that applied will be able to pass the rigorous physical examination and trade tests imposed by Air Force regulations for peacetime enlistment, but a complete registration of the remainder has been kept at military headquarters here by Squadron Leader McGowan, who is the Air Staff Officer for the district. This list will serve as a register in case of emergency.

## British Columbia Sends 7 Man Ring Squad

MONTREAL, April 24. — British Columbia is sending the largest ring squad to ever cross its border in quest of Canadian amateur boxing titles here this week. A seven-man team has left Vancouver headed for Montreal to participate in the Dominion tournament at the Forum next Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

Gordon McConnachie, who has earned the reputation of being the best bantam west of the Rockies, heads the Pacific Coast squad, which also includes Nick Serada, welterweight, who has already arrived here and gone into series training at the Crescent Athletic Club; Kenny Lyndsay and Joe Turner, flyweights; Dick Walsh, featherweight; Gordon Woodhouse, welterweight, and Ashenbrenner, middleweight.

Arnold Bertram, boxing instructor of the Grandview Athletic Club of Vancouver is accompanying the western fighters on their eastern jaunt. He has arranged for his fighters to train in the baggage car daily during their long rail journey here. He's taking no chances of his proteges lacking condition upon their arrival in Montreal next Tuesday.

It is planned to have the British Columbia team break their journey at Winnipeg for a day's rest and training spell at one of the gyms there. They are headed here with great reputations compiled in western rings fully realizing the tasks that confront them in their bids for titularistic honors in the Dominion meet.

The sixteen fighters comprising the team named from the recent Golden Gloves tournament to represent this province in the championships have been training daily. Billy Zed, University Settlement ring mentor, has been kept busy sending Joe Gagnon, who retained his Golden Glove bantam crown this year, and Babe Gagnon, who captured the featherweight title, through their paces. ## OLYMPIC SKATERS NAME AT ANNUAL CONVENTION

MONTREAL, April 24. — The question of recommending figure and speed skaters from the Amateur Skating Association of Canada, which is left to William E. Roughton, president of the controlling body on all skating in Canada, to take part in the 1940 Olympic Winter Sports in Switzerland, will not be settled before the Annual Convention of the Canadian body takes place November next, was announced by Champlain Provencher, honorary secretary.

Of course, said Mr. Provencher, it is up to the Canadian Olympic Committee to send the recommended skaters to the Olympic Winter Games and defray the expenses of the trip.

"Following the rule established by our predecessors in office, we do not interfere with the work of the Canadian Olympic Committee in sending athletes to any Olympic Games, but when any grant is made by the Canadian Government to that Committee we are in our right to find out why our skaters do not get any consideration when comes the time to send them to take part in the speed and figure ice skating competitions pertaining to the Olympic Games," says Mr. Provencher.

"The Dominion Government contributed \$10,000 to the Canadian Olympic Committee for the participation of Canadian athletes at the VI Olympiad held at Garmisch-Partenkirchen and Berlin, Germany, in 1936, and yet at the time the Canadian Olympic Committee could not defray the expenses of any ice skater to the Games, especially when we had point winners for Canada in Frank Stack and Alex Hurd, members of the team of speed skaters recommended to the Canadian Olympic Committee by president W. E. Roughton of the Amateur Skating Association of Canada.

## MONTREAL WAITS FOR BOXING TILT AT FORUM

MONTREAL, April 24.—Nick Serada, welterweight from Vancouver, is the first of the out of town fighters to arrive here for the Canadian amateur boxing championships to be held at the Forum on Wednesday and Thursday, April 26 and 27.

The Pacific Coast representative put in an appearance at the Crescent Athletic Club, sponsors of the title meet, and availed himself of the club's gymnasium for an initial work out. He stated that he was satisfied with his condition after a brisk drill, in which he punched the heavy bag and went a few rounds with local fighters, who were also working out.

Serada explained the reason why he came here one week in advance of the championships was to make certain that he would be in first class condition for what he considers the greatest test of his ring career. He fully realizes that to win a Canadian crown a fighter has to be in the very best of shape.

Officials of the Crescent Athletic Club have placed their gym at the disposal of the out of town fighters for conditioning purposes and the club's two coaches will also be available for any instruction that the visiting fighters desire.

Plans for the international tournament to be staged by the Y.M.H.A. between the winners of the Canadian crowns in this week's championship and United States titleholders at the Forum on Monday, May 15, are rapidly taking shape according to Louie DeZwirek, chairman of the Y.M.H.A. boxing section. The Canadian fighters will be equipped with white satin shorts trimmed with red, while the United States fighters will wear red satin shorts trimmed with white. These shorts along with a satin lined bathrobe will be given the fighters, and become their personal property.

Ben Silverman, noted water polo and basketball official of the Y. M. H. A., has been drafted for service on the boxing committee to handle the international tournament. He will have charge of the distribution of tickets.

Dennis White, supervisor of amateur boxing in this province, will name the Canadian team to oppose the visiting New Yorkers.

Russ Leighton, manager of the Crescent Athletic Club, announced today that there is a distinct possibility of the team of European champions to meet the Chicago Golden Gloves titleholders at Chicago on May 12 and a New England championship team at Boston on May 15, coming here to meet a team comprised of the Canadian winners in the Y. M. H. A. international tournament on or about May 21.

## FISH LEADERS NOW SUPPLIED INVISIBLE

A new fishing leader, which will not fray, split or become brittle, is invisible in water and possesses elastic qualities permitting a uniform "give" of about one inch per foot and resuming normal length with much the same action as a rubber band, has just been made available to the Canadian angling world.

Designed to fill the place in the fishing fraternity now occupied by Spanish silk-worm gut, the new leader will be placed on the market in standard weights and lengths, both level and tapered. Actual field tests by expert anglers have shown that the new leader, made of nylon synthetic filament, a recent product of the chemical laboratory, is far superior in every way to the Spanish gut and is consequently in no way a substitute for the old-fashioned leaders any more than Spanish gut was a substitute for the horsehair leaders of long ago.

The new leaders can be tied dry and without moistening of any kind will straighten out perfectly with a slight pull. The strength of the new leader material is equal to that of the best natural gut and possesses exceptional wearing qualities because the material contains no fibres and every strand is chemically controlled. The leader sinks as readily as natural gut—an important feature for the dry fly fisherman—and, having considerably less sheen, is less visible when in use. The leader material itself absorbs a very minute percentage of water and its resiliency remains regardless of how long it may be in use in alkaline and other destructive waters.

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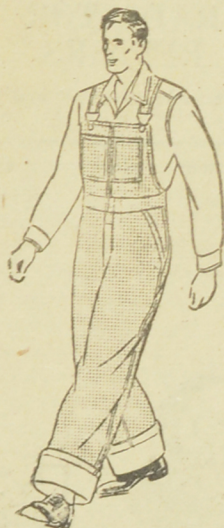
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
