

WILD N.H.L. GAME SEES 24 PENALTIES

LEAFS DEFEATED BLACK HAWKS 3-1 IN BATTLE ROYAL SATURDAY NIGHT THAT SAW EVEN FANS SWING FISTS

Toronto Lost Second Game to Wings in Shutout by Thompson; Canadiens, Amerks Play Two Overtime Draws; Hawks, Rangers Also Draw.

TORONTO, Jan. 16.—When you are penalized in the National Hockey League, apparently the best procedure is to shut up and take it. Objection too strenuously to referees—especially Mickey Ion—is bad business.

Four puck warriors who participated in the comedy of penalties as the Maple Leafs thumped Chicago Black Hawks 3-1 here Saturday learned that silence is golden. Three of them received Ion to the extent of drawing 10-minute misconduct sentences while one earned a match misconduct banishment.

The hockey was only fair but excitement ran high the full 60 minutes as 24 penalties were handed out, four of them majors.

Even the customers joined in the spirit of things and as Bill MacKenzie, Chicago defenceman, stepped into the cooler in the second period, a female fan socked him on the chin.

Soon after the players started skating and out of a free-for-all, Earl Seibert and Johnny Gottselig of the Hawks, and Nick Metz and Gord Drillon of the Leafs, drew majors.

Drillon sent the Leafs in front early in the initial period while Bob Gracie was serving time. The Leafs added a pair in the second, Murphy Chamberlain scoring what proved the winning counter, and Pep Kelly rifling one from his favorite right wing as both clubs battled two men short.

Bill Thoms, former Leaf, spoiled the shutout hopes of his former teammate, Turk Broda, when he slapped home a rebound in the third period.

Paul Thompson, Chicago's playing manager, Art Wiebe, and Reg Hamilton drew the 10-minute misconduct penalties and Phil Besler the match misconduct.

Thompson Blanks Leafs
DETROIT, Jan. 16.—A sparkling performance in the nets by goalie Cecil (Tiny) Thompson enabled Detroit Red Wings to shut out Toronto Maple Leafs 1-0 in a National Hockey League game played before a crowd of 12,177 last night.

The winning goal was scored by Gus Giesebrecht, Detroit rookie late in the second period while Rudolph (Bingo) Kampman of the Maple Leafs was serving a penalty.

Play 1-1 Deadlock
MONTREAL, Jan. 16.—Since the start of the New Year Montreal Canadiens might well be termed to have been working on the theory that half a loaf is better than none. In seven National Hockey League games the Flying Frenchmen have tied four, lost two and won one.

Their latest drawn effort came here Saturday night when they played through 70 minutes to a 1-1 tie with Red Dutton's third-place New York Americans before a crowd of 6,000.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—New York Americans and Montreal Canadiens battled to a 1-1 overtime tie in a National Hockey League encounter here last night, duplicating the score of their meeting in Montreal last night. It was Canadiens' fifth tie in the last eight games.

Rangers, Hawks Tie
CHICAGO, Jan. 16.—New York Rangers moved up to within a game of the league-leading Boston Bruins last night, with a 1-1 overtime tie with Chicago Black Hawks.

The tie moved Black Hawks to within a game of the fourth-place Toronto Maple Leafs in the National Hockey League standing.

U.N.B. SEXTET TO MEET M'ADAM OUTFIT TONIGHT

Red and Black Six Held Senators in 5-4 Loss

The University of N. B. hockey team will play an exhibition game at McAdam tonight against the McAdam C.P.R. team, it was stated last night by Gordon Gaulton, Saint John, manager of the U.N.B. team. The Red and Black dropped a 5 to 4 decision to St. Andrews Senators a few nights ago with only two practice sessions and their showing has so pleased the coach, Dr. J. R. Akins that further exhibition games with Southern New Brunswick Hockey League teams may be arranged.

The Red and Black this season is considerably stronger than that of last with plenty of scoring power packed in two well-balanced forward lines and with an improved defence.

Ralph Lockhart, of Sussex, former Mount Allison Academy star, will pivot one line with Bill Napier of Campbellton on left wing and Pete Perley of Bathurst on right wing. This line scored all four U.N.B. goals at St. Andrews. The other line is composed of Eric Lutes, Bathurst, at centre with Cec Covey, veteran Fredericton athlete, on right and Bob Burgess of Shubenacadie on left wing. Earl McDermitt, former Edmundston High School player, will be reserve forward tonight. On defence Coach Akins will use Dick Logie, Bellville, Ont., Clyde Smith, Gordon Ross, both of Edmundston and Roy Brown, Rothesay. Hep Wilson will guard the net.

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Terry Has Giants Face Lifted Starting Lineup to Introduce 5 New Players

New York, Jan. 16.—Quietly was the job performed that it scarcely stirred a word of comment, yet the fact is that Will Terry has performed a major operation upon his Giants. Not in years has a ball club been so thoroughly overhauled between seasons as has the Polo Grounds squad.

In April the Colonel's starting lineup will introduce no fewer than five new players new in the sense, anyway, that they didn't appear in the opening day lineup a year ago.

COMPLETE NEW INFELD
The Manhattan infield has been completely made over. Zeke Bonura at first base, Burgess Whitehead at second base, Billy Jurgens in the shortfield, and George Myatt at third base—not one was a Giant regular last year.

Whitehead has been a member of the Manhattan roster for three years, of course, but illness kept him on the sidelines last year, as Boss Terry employed no fewer than five different second-base-men. Myatt came up from Jersey City late in the year; Bonura was acquired from Washington recently, and Jurgens was obtained in the deal that also identifies Frank Demaree as the new Polo Grounds center fielder.

Opinion is divided as to whether or not the numerous changes are beneficial, but Terry takes the stand that he has nothing to lose and much to gain. Last year's team definitely failed to measure up to championship standards; it couldn't win in a year when the league was weaker than in any season since the war.

ATTACK STRONGER

The new setup undoubtedly sacrifices something in the way of defensive skill, since Bonura is a mediocre fielder and Demaree is a weak thrower, but should add materially to the team's batting power. Demaree hit .335 at Chicago two years ago, and Bonura is one of the game's ranking home run thumpers.

The world's championship Yankees don't find it necessary to revise their batting order, but Joe McCarthy has deemed it advisable to fortify his pitching staff and realign his reserve squad.

The hard-hitting Buddy Rosar, up from Newark, replaces Joe Glenn as Bill Dickey's catching understudy, and Charlie Keller, tabbed as the rookie of the year, joins the outfield brigade.

HURLING REINFORCED
The pitching reinforcement is Oral Hildebrand, a veteran of the American League wars, obtained from the St. Louis Browns. He is scarcely a ranking flipper, but will represent a safeguard in the event Wes Farrell and Spud Chandler fail to recover from the operations to which they've recently submitted their pitching flippers.

The Brooklyn Dodgers have loaded their roster with new men, but in all likelihood the opening day lineup will present only two newcomers, Pete Coscarart at second base and Gene Moore in right field. All the other likely starters, Camille, Lavagetto, Durocher, Babe Phelps behind the plate, Stainback and Koy, are holdovers.

Hialeah Boasts Many Turf Leaders For '38

Race Track is Flooded With Stars

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 16.—Speaking of statistics, Hialeah Park can boast of many "Leaders" in the turf news of 1938.

Directly or indirectly Hialeah which is making ready for another season of Sport, Jan. 11 to March 4, can point with pride to various noteworthy accomplishments of horses, horsemen, trainers and jockeys.

Heading the list is Joseph E. Widener, president of The Miami jockey Club, it was Widener's Sickle which became the leading sire of all horses in 1938, his produce earning \$327,822. The Elmendorf stallion previously earned the title in 1936. Sickle foaled in 1924, by Phalaris-Selene, was bred in England by Lord Derby and imported to the United States in 1929 by Widener who took up his option on the horses for \$125,000 in 1932.

LEAD MONEY-WINNERS

Stagehand, leading three-year-old as well as money-winning thoroughbred of 1938 with \$189,710, was bred by the master of Elmendorf.

Son of Sickle and Stagecraft, Stagehand annexed the last Santa Anita Handicap and boosted Maxwell Howard to the top as leading money-winner owner of the year with \$226,495, and Trainer Earl Sande to the leading money-winning trainer with the same sum credited to his ability.

Stagehand was purchased prior to making his two-year-old debut of Widener by Maxwell Howard who annually winters at Miami Beach.

Inscoelda, champion two-year-old filly, is at Hialeah. The champion three-year-old filly, Jacola, is nominated for the \$50,000 added Widener Challenge Cup on March 4. Also nominated are the four leading money-winning thoroughbreds of the American turf last year, namely Stagehand with \$189,710, Seabiscuit with \$130,395, Lawrin with \$123,215, and War Admiral with \$90,840.

SECOND IN WINNINGS
The Wolford Farm, owned by Herbert M. Woolf, Kansas City sportsman, and already quartered at Hialeah in charge of Trainer Ben Jones, was the second largest money-winning stable of the year with \$211,950.

Among the money-winning three-year-olds, Lawrin was second to Stagehand with a sum of \$123,215. The training title again went to Hirsch Jacobs of Forest Hills, N. Y. It was the sixth consecutive year that the New Yorker led all conditioners in the number of winners saddled. Jacobs accounted for 116 winners in 1938, 127 in 1935, 114 in 1935, 117 in 1936, 134 in 1937 and 109 in 1938. Jacobs has another large stable of horses at Hialeah and will make a bid for his seventh championship in a row.
