GIBRALTAR AGAIN
RINGS TO SONGS
OF SOLDIERY

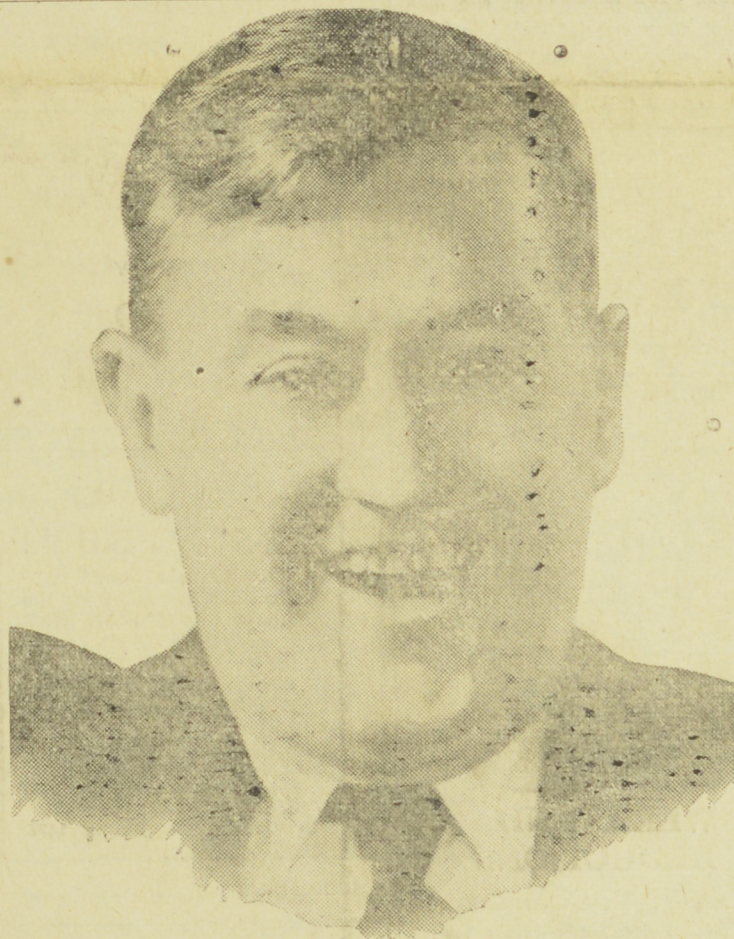
GIBRALTAR, April 25.—The ring- ing choruses of Great War songs, sung by British soldiers, sailors and air Force men and sailors of the French Fleet, gave evidence today that Great Britain and France were again allied for peace or war.

Three French cruisers recently joined the two destroyers which had been maintaining a close patrol of the Strait of Gibraltar, and the crews of more than 20 French warships, here to guard the strait while the British fleet massed in the Eastern Mediterranean, fraternized with their British comrades.

The narrow streets of Gibraltar were crowded day and night with gay parties of British and French sailors. Horse-drawn carriages took mixed parties on sightseeing tours. At night, there was an impromptu dance and concert in every hotel, and the familiar songs of the Great War such as "Tipperary," "The Mar-

"Blue snow," announced he. "Blue snow."

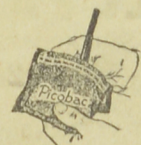
"What do you mean, 'blue snow'?" demanded Mrs. Picobac.

"You get your galoshes on and get that walk cleared," said Mrs. Picobac.

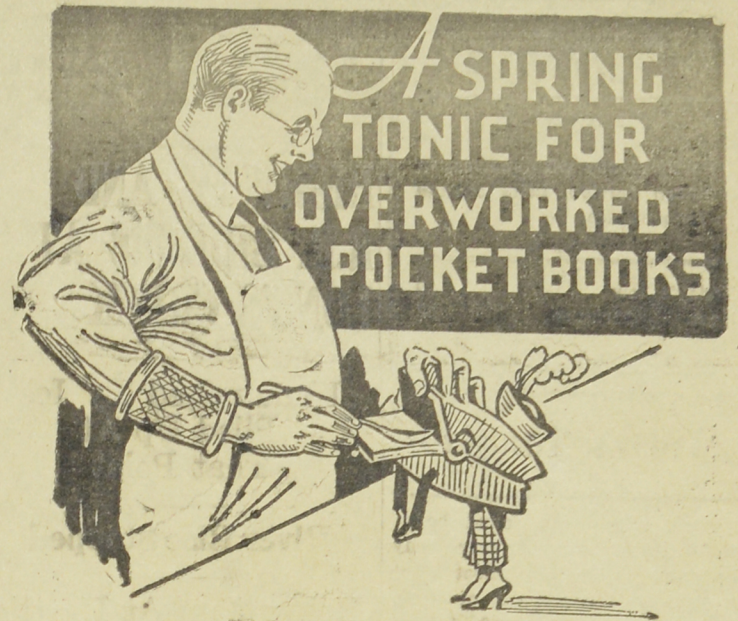

GOT MEDALS
20 YEARS LATE

DETROIT, April 25.—Alf McLeod, who preferred action in France to a soft spot in England during the Great War, proudly wears his medals today, although they came 20 years late. The trophies were pinned on the 66 year old veteran by the acting British Consul, Arthur Bray, here last week.

Called to the colors in 1918 at the age of 45, McLeod was told he could stay in Britain but he asked to go to the front. He emigrated to Canada in 1919 before receiving his medals and went to the United States four years later. The British Legion procured the awards for him recently.
