DIES SUDDENLY
AT HOME IN
NORTH DEVON

Albert F. Harrison Is
Mourned By Vast
Circle Friends

Countless friends in this city, Devon, and the surrounding district were shocked today to learn of the sudden death of Albert Frederick Harrison, which occurred at his home, North Devon, at an early hour this morning. In ill health for some time and suffering from a heart ailment, the deceased had not been able to work for some time but had been around and out of doors up until last evening.

He was very well known in the city and district, and his many friends will mourn his passing. The deceased, who was only 35, was in Fredericton last evening, but was taken suddenly ill at his home and passed away before 4 a.m. today.

He was a member of the 90th Battery, R.C.A., this city, and a non-commissioned officer of the unit. He was highly esteemed and respected by all who knew him. Of a friendly sociable disposition, his passing will be widely mourned. He belonged to several church groups and was prominent in the affairs of the George Street Baptist Church, this city. He was also a member of the Sons of England.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Thomas Harrison, one brother, Marvin T. Harrison, and two sisters, Mrs. Joan Belyea, this city, and Miss Jane Harrison, at home.

The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon with service at the late home, North Devon, at 2 o'clock. Rev. John Linton will conduct the service. Interment will be made at Sunny Bank Cemetery. The funeral will be a military service with the Artillery units, this city, taking part.

Jam Fails To Take Two Bridges

HIGHWAY AND
R.R. BRIDGES AT
LONG'S CREEK

Undamaged By Ice
Piled Up At
That Point

River Rise Stopped

Heavy Jam At Hart's
Island Holding Up
Break-Up

Reports to the effect that the highway bridge at Long's Creek, 18 miles above this city had been taken out by the ice jam at that point, were denied today. C. A. McVey, chief highway engineer for the province inspected the scene of the jam today and found that no damage had been done to the bridge. The railway bridge at that point was not damaged.

Ice in the Saint John river at Fredericton moved about 300 yards last night but was stationary again today. A jam at Hart's Island was holding up the break-up, although rivermen here expected the jam to let go at any moment and clear the river at this point.

Although the jam at the island was reported to be great, it is not believed that it is backing up any huge head of water. It was pointed out today that had the jam been tight the level at this point would have dropped rapidly, whereas the drop was only one foot. This drop took place from 11 p.m. yesterday to 3 a.m. this morning. Since that time the level has remained at 15 feet above summer low.

It was thought today that the jam would break by tomorrow and that the ice would run here by that time.

N. B. TWEEDS MAY
BE EXHIBITED
AT WORLD'S FAIR

D. W. Griffiths, Head of
N. B. Bureau And
Staff to New York

It was reported today that a section of the New Brunswick Fashion Show which was exhibited in Fredericton, Saint John, and Moncton, will be taken to the New York World's Fair later in the season as part of the New Brunswick exhibit there. It is understood that exhibits of the work done in New Brunswick weaving and handicrafts will be displayed, and a number of the young ladies who studied the weaving courses will demonstrate the work for the benefit of the thousands who will attend the fair which opens on April 30.

D. W. Griffiths, director of the New Brunswick Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel and Byron M. Fisher left for New York last night. Mr. Griffiths will be in New York until some time in May, while Mr. Fisher will have charge of the New Brunswick booth at the fair. Miss Ada McAnn, Moncton, has also left for New York and will be associated with Mr. Fisher in the supervision of the booth.

It is expected that the New Brunswick booth will be responsible for a considerable amount of publicity for the province to the benefit of the tourist and sporting industries. A newspaper column to be written by Mr. Fisher has already been hooked by a great number of papers in Canada and the United States. Considerable publicity will also be given the province through this medium.

FIRST PARTY
IN PROVINCE FOR
SALMON ANGLING

Permits Already Total
300 With 47 Permits
Being Non-Resident

Jack Russell of Ludlow, well known New Brunswick sporting camp operator took the honors this year for the first sporting party in the province. With the ice scarcely run out of the Ludlow area of the Miramichi, Mr. Russell has a party on the river at the present time for early spring salmon fishing.

The New Brunswick Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel predicts a good year for early salmon fishing from the viewpoint of sportsman traffic. Many inquiries have been received this year, and the outlook for the salmon fishing industry is said to be bright.

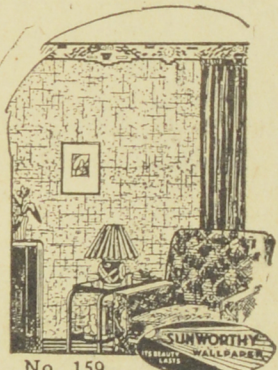
Over 200 permits have been issued for early salmon angling, it was learned today from the Dominion fisheries office in this city. Of this number 47 are non-resident permits. The season for spring salmon angling opened on April 1, but the fishing doesn't start until after the ice has run.

NO DAYLIGHT
TIME FOR CITY
OF FREDERICTON

Deny Report Appearing
In Press: Plebiscite
Settled Matter

The City of Fredericton today issued a denial to the report appearing in another section of the press to the effect that the city would go on daylight saving time on May 27. The matter of daylight time was voted down in a plebiscite held in connection with the civic elections two years ago in January. At that time it was decided that the ruling of the plebiscite would remain standing unless another plebiscite was held voting in favor of the measure.

"Fast time is a dead issue in Fredericton," Mayor C. Hedley Forbes stated this morning. It was pointed out at the city hall that another plebiscite would cost a considerable sum of money, and that one could not be held unless a strong representation of citizens demanded such. In the last plebiscite the plan was voted down with such a majority that it is thought improbable that the issue will again arise here.

An official denial of the report appearing in the Saint John press was forwarded from city hall this morning.

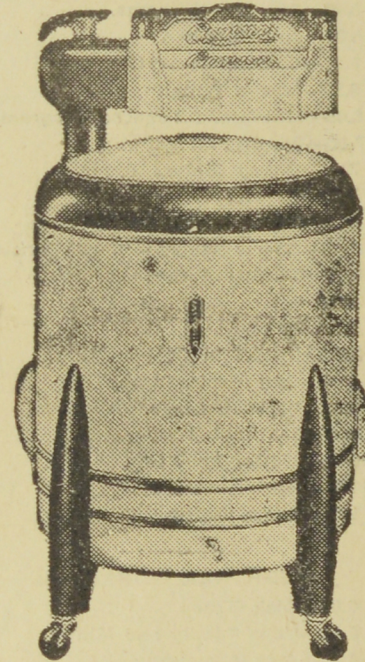
