

FOURTH GAME CUP FINALS TONIGHT

TORONTO MAPLE LEAFS AND MIGHTY BOSTON BRUINS CLASH AT TORONTO IN FOURTH HEAT FOR STANLEY CUP

Ross Confident of Win, Visions Famed Trophy On Bruins' Shelf: Ross to Retire at End Of Current Playing Season

TORONTO, April 13. — Ebuilient Arthur H. Ross, who can and will pronounce on just about anything in hockey, made a couple of pronouncements last night upon Arthur H. Ross and his immediate future as manager of Boston Bruins, the National League champions.

The first went: "I am going to bed early tonight and I will sleep now that the Bruins are on the way to the Stanley Cup."

The second: "I am leaving behind my bench duties this season. From now on I will do my job from the front office."

This was the frame of mind of Art Ross as his great Boston Club—the one he has called "the greatest team I have seen in my 37 years of hockey"—stood one game up on Toronto Maple Leafs in the Stanley Cup series. The series resumes tonight.

The general idea seemed to be that he believed the Bruins, after taking two of the first three games weren't going to cause him much more worry.

Won't Explain

Ross wouldn't enlarge on his declaration that he will retire from his bench duties next season. He wouldn't say who might succeed him. He might have said Cooney Weiland has been doing a good deal of the active direction this term and might be first in line for the bench position. But he didn't.

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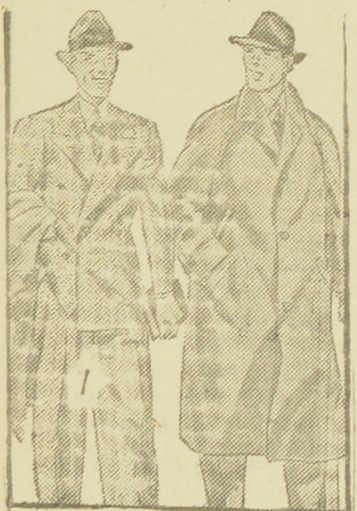
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Herkimer Hurricane After Pot Of Gold

HERKIMER, N. Y., April 13. — Luigi D'Ambrosio, who once rode the rods to watch Tony Canzoneri fight, left town pullman style bound toward a pot of gold at the end of the fistic rainbow. That would be the world's lightweight championship.

If there's anyone Luigi D'Ambrosio would rather see wearing the lightweight crown than Tony Canzoneri it's Luigi D'Ambrosio, known to the trade as Lou Ambers, the scrappy kid lots of people thought gave Henry Armstrong a neat pasting the night the little Negro lifted the title from the Herkimer Hurricane.

Ambers was just a young amateur when he rode a freight train to watch his idol, Canzoneri, in action. A few months later he worked as Tony's sparring partner. Then, one night, he actually won the crown from the ageing Tony. He lost it to Armstrong, but he hit the trail again yesterday and figures he'll come back champion.

TITLE CONQUEST

"If there was anyone I hated to beat, it was Canzoneri, Ambers said. "But that gave me the title and someone had to beat Tony, good as he was."

About the last Armstrong fight, Lou was evasive. "Gosh," said he, "it wasn't up to me, or the 19,000 people there the night Henry took my title—but it took 'em three hours to patch him up before they could take him out of his dressing room. Me, I left right away."

Lou figures he learned a lot from the Armstrong fight, "enough," he says, "so there won't be any doubt the next time."

LIFFORD DOWNS McLEOD IN 10 ROUND GO

"Irish Nolan" Tags Dupuis: Marysville Scrapper Wins

SAINT JOHN, April 13.—Using a jabbing left effectively and mixing it with right smashes and short uppercuts Johnny Lifford, Maritime lightweight champion, administered a neat lacing to "Babe" McLeod, Montreal lightweight, in a 10-round headliner of a fight card at St. Peter's Auditorium last night.

Lifford took practically every round although McLeod gave him stiff competition in the first, fifth and eighth.

Between 500 and 600 fight fans left the Auditorium well pleased with Mike Harrigan's first fight card, staged as a benefit to send five amateur boxers to the Maritime amateur meet in Truro next week as representatives of St. Peter's House Baseball League.

In the semi-final bout of the night "Irish" Nolan of Perth, put Adam Dupuis of Saint John away in one minute and 50 seconds of the third round of their scheduled six-round go.

Merlin Gauthier of Conny Rogan's stable, Saint John, took a clean-cut, six-round decision from Joe Thibodeau of Fredericton, formerly of Saint John, and in the curtain raiser, a scheduled four-round affair, "Slasher" Sullivan of Marysville slashed Allan James of Saint John down for the count in 30 seconds.

BAER, HOFFMAN FACE CHARGES

BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., April 13.—Max Baer, former heavyweight boxing champion, and his manager, Ancil Hoffman, have been ordered by Supreme Court Justice Riley Heath to appear here April 18 and bring with them records of their business transactions if they want to avoid being held in contempt of court.

Justice Heath acted in a \$20,000 negligence suit brought by Frank R. McKeeby of Binghampton. McKeeby filed the claim as result of injuries he allegedly suffered in 1935 when a grandstand at Speculator, N. Y., collapsed while he was watching Baer in an exhibition bout. The fighter and his manager contend they had no part in operation of the grandstand.

GAME TONIGHT IS BROADCAST

The Imperial Oil hockey broadcast from Toronto will be on the air again tonight with Foster Hewitt giving the play by play description of the fourth game of the Stanley Cup finals between the Toronto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins.

GENERALS DOWN ROAMERS 12-4

TORONTO, April 13.—In one of the greatest scoring orgies ever witnessed in championship hockey, Oshawa Generals smothered Edmonton Roamers, 12-4 here last night and all but wiped out the western champions' hopes of winning the Memorial Cup. It was Oshawa's second straight victory and another win in the third game of the best of five series here Saturday night will give Generals the cup won by St. Boniface Seals last year.

Picking up where he left off in the first game, Billy Taylor led the eager Oshawa horde in their quest for goals. The brilliant centre, who scored five times in the series opener, marked up four more tonight and aided in five others.

Roamers made a game bid to live up to the advance notices. They matched Generals goals for goal in the first period which ended in a 2-2 tie. But after that the red-clad Generals ran wild, scoring three in the second and seven more in the third. Edmonton's other two goals came in the third.

JACOBS CONCERNED OVER BOMBER

LOS ANGELES, April 13.—Michael Strauss Jacobs, the New York, boxing impresario who is part-promoter of the Joe Louis-Jack Roper heavyweight title scrap here next Monday night, expressed concern today over reports that the "Brown Bomber" was trained poorly.

"The only thing that's worrying me right now is these reports that the champion don't look so good in training," Jacobs remarked. "That's why I came on early for the fight. You got a big program lined up for Louis this summer and I don't want him to blow his title through not training properly."

KALLENBERG ON GIANTS ROSTER

ST. STEPHEN, April 13.—Ken Kallenberg, moundsman for the St. Croix Maritime baseball champions, has received a call from Bill Terry to report to Milford, Delaware, where he will work out with the Milford Giants. Terry sent him a contract a short time ago on the strength of a recommendation of a man who saw him pitch with the St. Stephen team last season.

Milford is one of the Giants' farm clubs. Ken had been working out daily in the Calais gym with Hank Hamilton and indications are that he is pitching better this year than ever. Every person on the border regrets to see Ken leave but are pulling for him to make good in the fast company.

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
