REFUGEES ARE TURNED BACK

JERUSALEM, April 13 —More than 1,000 Jewish immigrants sailed the Mediterranean today in three ships which had been turned back from the shores of Palestine.

Two steamships had been turned back already when, today the Greek steamship Assini, with 200 refugees, was halted near Caesarea and turned back to sea.

European countries which have anti-Jewish campaigns sometimes send shiploads of refugees to Palestine for whom arrangements have been made in the country of destination.

NOVA SCOTIA GETS CREDIT FOR N. B. INITIATIVE

Despite the fact that New Brunswick was a pioneer in the establishment of forestry courses in management of the farm woodlot, a recent item appearing in press copy issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Publicity and Extension Division, gives the palm of praise to Nova Scotia.

The item states that "Nova Scotia as a province, has shown an example in enrolling 30 young men from the farms for the first forestry course of its kind in the province."

New Brunswick, which in reality was a pioneer in the establishment of such courses at the Acadian Forestry Experimental Station at Fredericton, was not mentioned in the article.

Hon. F. W. Pirie, Minister of Lands and Mines, stated this morning that he would take action to see that New Brunswick is mentioned in its proper perspective as an instigator of farm woodlot courses.

The section of the Dominion press copy dealing with the matter in question read as follows:

"From the standpoint of better woodlot management and organized effort to take advantage of existing markets, Nova Scotia, as a province, has shown an example in enrolling 30 young men from the farms for the first forestry course of its kind in the province. These young farmers commenced a six weeks' course on March 15 at the 78-square mile Acadian forestry experimental station at Fredericton, N. B., with the main idea of becoming expert managers of the farm wood lot."

The galleries of the House were filled to capacity. The Duke of Kent was among the audience, as well as the Belgian and Russian ambassadors.

SCORES ITALY

Touching on Albania, the British Prime Minister said the whole world was profoundly shocked at Italy's action. He declared it was simply a case of a powerful nation imposing her will on a relatively defenceless one. The Albanian King, he disclosed, had asked Britain for her support as they desperately fought to maintain their independence. The action of Mussolini, he said, must inevitably cause much increased uneasiness and tension in Europe and the world.

The Prime Minister did not mince words when he declared that Mussolini had flaunted the Italian-Anglo accord and had disturbed the status quo in the Mediterranean. He did not, however, denounce the accord.

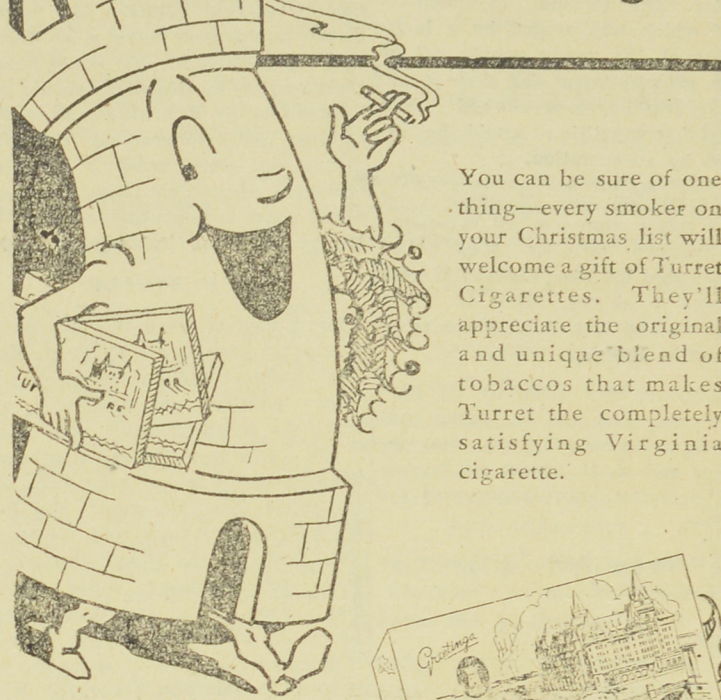
TURKEY MENTIONED

Turkey was mentioned significantly in the statement, it being pointed out that Greece and Turkey are closely allied.

Mr. Chamberlain caused a break in the atmosphere of the House when he mentioned the offer of the Albanian crown to King Victor Emmanuel. "We await anxiously the answer of Italy to that offer," he said, as the House sounded with laughter.

In answer to interruptions from the opposition, he stated that Britain is keeping in close contact with Russia. He also said that Britain is marshalling all possible forces in the cause of peace against any further aggression.

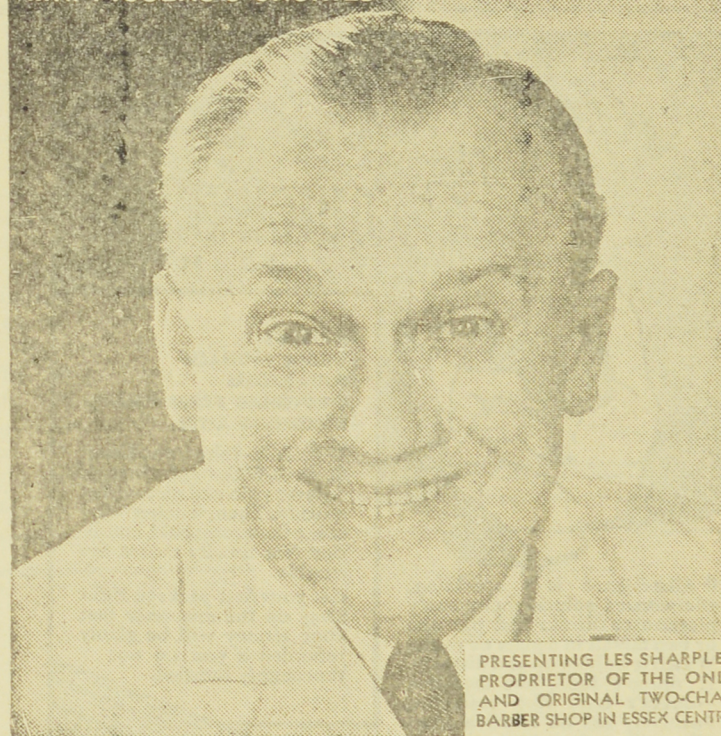
