ANSWER: Bid four hearts. While three clubs should be set, the penalty will probably not be large in view of your long heart suit and singleton club. But with hearts trump you have a very powerful hand and should make game. Score 100 per cent for four hearts, 660 per cent, for pass, 30 per cent, for three hearts (a sign-off bid that shows weakness).

This hand, played in a recent Duplicate game, was bid in many different ways, and actually only a single North-South pair were content with the only Slam contract that can be made—six clubs. Their bidding is shown above, and while at first glance it appears that South has a flogging spade, he avoided this by establishing North's diamond suit. In the course of the play South ruffed two low diamonds and the Ace-King-Jack were then good for spade discards.

Most pairs contracted for six notrump in an endeavour to achieve a top score. The two hands have eleven top tricks and there is a possible squeeze in view for the twelfth. At this contract North would be Declarer, and after knocking out the club Ace would run off five tricks in that suit plus his two top hearts. At this stage North would hold the King and one spade plus the Ace-King-Jack of diamonds and if by some chance one of the

defensive players held the diamond Queen plus three spades, he would be squeezed. However West was able to guard diamonds, his partner spades, and thus the ambitious contract was doomed to defeat. this increase largely to the advertisement at the sportsmen's shows, and the efforts of the New Brunswick Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel.

Value of Business

He stressed the value of the fishing business to the province, pointing out that each sportsman leaves an average of \$50 in equipment and supplies alone. He estimated that \$29,625 was left in the province by the spring fishermen last year.

Defending the issuing of spring permits, he pointed out that the fish have already deposited their spawn at the head of the rivers and are on their way back to the sea when caught. Science states that in any event only 6% of these fish will return to the river.

The fish caught last year through early permits brought a revenue to the province that actually paid \$1.78 per pound for the fish.

Considerable discussion took place on the matter of a bear bounty. The matter was shelved, however, to be gone into at this morning's session.
