SEES MINORITY PROBLEM IN SASKATCHEWAN

SASKATOON, April 12 — Walter B. Caswell, in an address to war veterans celebrating anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, said Saskatchewan's German-speaking population would create a minority problem if strong steps to prevent it were not taken.

"It is time the people of Saskatchewan became aware of this situation," said Mr. Caswell, who is a Saskatoon alderman but stated he was speaking as a war veteran and not as a representative of the city. He admonished war veterans to do something about the German problem. "You can't maintain democracy by any weak-kneed policy," he said. "If these people do not want to be good Canadians and conform to the Canadian manner of living, then we don't want them here."

Mr. Caswell said the German population in Saskatchewan had increased from 95,000 to 165,000 in 1936.

ANOTHER VICTIM FALLS TO CURSE

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 12—One more of the party of Lord Carnarvon which explored the 32-centuries-old tomb of the boy King Tutankhamen has died. Dr. Jean Ahmad Brochet, Los Angeles endocrinologist who was killed a week ago in a traffic accident, was an archaeologist with the Carnarvon expedition, his widow, Joann Brochet, said.

Inscribed on the walls of the Egyptian King's crypt were these words: "Death shall come on swift wings to him that toucheth the tomb of the Pharaoh."

GATLINBURG, Tenn., April 12 — A young couple chose a 40-foot observation tower atop the highest peak east of the Mississippi River for their "leap into matrimony." In an Easter Sunday ceremony on 6,643-foot Clingman's Dome, in the Great Smoky Mountains, Charles Ogle, 20, of Gatlinburg, married Miss Mary Agnew, 18, of Baldwin, Miss. More than 100 persons climbed a half-mile patch from the highway.

Second Tallest Man Marries

ROCKFORD, Ill., April 12 Clifford Thompson, 34, of Scandinavia, Wis., who claims to be the second tallest man in the world, and Mary Bars, 32, of Milwaukee, were wed here, Thompson is eight feet, seven inches tall and weighs 460 pounds. His bride is five feet, five inches tall. They met a year ago while both were working for a circus.

Thompson claims he is outgianted only by Robert Wadlow, of Alton, Ill., whose height is eight feet, 8 1/2 inches. Still growing at 21, Wadlow weighs 491 pounds.

QUEBEC HAD NEARLY 7 FEET OF SNOW IN MONTH

QUEBEC, April 12 — Almost seven feet of snow fell here in February, according to the meteorological report issued for that month from the Quebec rivers and streams Commission. A total of 82.40 inches fell in this district in February with only 0.53 inches of rain.

Quebec City had 76 hours of sun or 26 per cent compared with 102 hours or 35 per cent in February, 1938.

In the Montreal city district 38.70 inches of snow fell with 0.49 inches of rain.

Sherbrooke received 27.80 inches of snow and 1.50 inches of rain and Three Rivers 45.50 inches of snow and 0.65 inches of rain.

Modern Man Has Grown Larger

BOSTON, April 12 — Suits of armor of the knights of old would be "too small" for the average modern man, a Yale University scientist said as he offered new "pelvic" evidence that the "human race has grown larger" in recent generations.

Attributing it to athletics and "better living conditions," Dr. William Greulich said X-ray studies of a group of medical students and student nurses had shown a "definitely superior physical status" was associated with a "relative elongation of the true... diameter of the pelvis."

Greulich explained "recent studies at Harvard" had shown there has been "a progressive increase in size" of men in successive generations.

Denied Auditorium, Sings In Square

WASHINGTON, April 12—Marian Anderson, Negro singer denied a capital auditorium, sang a free concert from the steps of Lincoln Memorial to a crowd estimated by police at more than 75,000.

The singer, wearing a mink coat against the sharp coolness of the sunny afternoon stood a few feet below the Abraham Lincoln statue surrounded by notables, including a Supreme Court justice, two Cabinet members and several Senators.

Interior Secretary Ickes, introducing Miss Anderson, did not mention by name the Daughters of the American Revolution, which refused to permit Miss Anderson to sing in its auditorium—Constitution Hall. He lauded Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln for stressing equality of opportunity.
