**HUGE CROWD SEES MONTREAL ROYALS DOWN BEARS**

MONTREAL, May 8.—Before the largest crowd ever to witness an international League baseball game here—20,352, Montreal Royals dropped two close decisions to the champion Newark Bears yesterday. The scores were 1-0 and 6-5.  
  
The doubleheader victory advanced Bears to sole possession of second place, one game behind the leading Jersey City Giants. Montreal were set back to fourth position.  
  
The first contest was a pitchers' duel between Marius Russo, Newark southpaw, and Bob Porter, Royals' right-hander. Tach allowed five hits in the nightcap.  
  
Toronto batters rattled basehits off every fence in the park to rout Buffalo Bisons 17-3 at Buffalo.  
  
The Maple Leafs, led by M. Smith, who hit safely four out of five times at bat, pounded six Bison pitchers for 24 hits. Mulligan went the route for Toronto.  
  
Jersey City and Syracuse split a doubleheader before 7,000 fans at Syracuse, the Little Giants pounding out a 9-2 win in the opener, while the Chiefs came back with a 4-1 victory in the nightcap.  
  
Rochester divided a doubleheader with Baltimore, 7-3 and 6-3, before a home crowd of 6,533.  
  
Art Park's 10th inning home run Saturday gave Montreal a 6-5 victory over Baltimore. Toronto went lower in the league cellar by dropping both ends of a doubleheader to Syracuse Chiefs by scores of 4-3 in each game. Newark bunched 12 hits and six walks to swamp Rochester 10-0. Jersey City set Buffalo back 10-7.

**BANK CANADA WILL CALL FOR NEW BOND ISSUE**

OTTAWA, May 8.—The Bank of Canada will open subscriptions Wednesday for a new \$115,202,500 Dominion of Canada conversion loan, Hon. Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance announced Saturday.  
  
The announcement said that cash subscriptions of \$50,000,000 would be invited and holders of Dominion of Canada bonds due in 1939 would have the opportunity of converting their bonds into the new bonds.  
  
The new loan will consist of 1 1/2 per cent non-callable bonds due May 15, 1942, priced at 99.375 and accrued interest, to yield approximately 1.72 per cent, and three per cent callable bonds, due June 1, 1958, priced at 98.50 and accrued interest, to yield approximately 3.10 per cent. The 1 1/2 per cent bonds will be of \$1,000 denomination, and the three per cent of \$100, \$500, and \$1,000.

**MONTREAL'S BAD MEN GET TERMS TOTALING 70 YRS.**

MONTREAL, May 8.—Two armed bandits who terrorized store and restaurant clerks in the central and eastern sections of the city during the past few weeks with a series of 14 holdups, received sentences totalling 70 years in prison by Judge Langlois Saturday. They will actually spend only five years each in prison, however.  
  
The prisoners are Douglas Castle, 30, responsible for nine robberies, and Albert Fuhrman, who committed five hold-ups.  
  
Castle, who was captured on Thursday night on Cyprus street, as the result of a "double play" by a Laura Secord Candy Shops salesgirl and a locksmith after he had attempted to rob the salesgirl in the Peel street store, pleaded guilty when arraigned last week on the nine charges.  
  
He returned to court however, and told Judge Langlois that he had misunderstood the proceedings when he pleaded not guilty. His offer to plead guilty to all charges was accepted.  
  
Fuhrman is the young bandit who was captured a week ago Saturday afternoon a few minutes after he had tried a daylight robbery at a biscuit factory at 1846 St. Catherine street east. He pleaded guilty to five charges of hold-up when arraigned on Tuesday.  
  
He was scheduled for sentence on May 13, but he stated in answer to a question from Judge Langlois that he was ready to be sentenced then.  
  
Each prisoner was sentenced to five years on each of the several charges against him, the terms to run concurrently.

**FLYING CLUB IS DEFINITE SAYS PILOT**

The formation of a flying club in Fredericton is a definite thing in one way or another, it was stated today by R. Fletcher, who had a plane of the Saint John Flying Club at Fredericton during the winter for student instruction work.  
  
A proposal was under way for some time to form a commercial flying club here with an interested group of business men proposing to purchase a plane and operate it for both instruction work and charter flights. If this plan does not materialize, it was stated today, Mr. Fletcher plans to bring a plane here and operate it as an independent venture.  
  
In the absence of an airport, it is understood that the plane will be equipped with floats and flown off the river.
