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Loaded Team Crossed River Yesterday For Record

Beginning Monday, all paved roads in the counties of Queens, Sunbury and York will be closed to traffic having a heavier gross load than 6,000 pounds, it was announced today by C. B. Croasdale, chief highway engineer for the province.

One exception to the rule is passenger busses, which are allowed a registered weight of 8,500 pounds.

A record was created here yesterday when a heavily loaded team crossed the ice from the Bathing Beach to the Nashwaaksis creek without difficulty. Shore ice is still as solid as ever, and the team did not break through in any place. No teams had crossed the ice this morning, however.
