NEW YORK, April 17.—Minorities and Democracy will be the theme of the Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the American Association for Adult Education which will be held at Niagara Falls, May 15, 16, and 17. Members of the Canadian Association for Adult Education will be guests of the American Association, and a number of Canadian educators who have accepted invitations to speak include John W. Studebaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education; F. P. Keppel, President of the Carnegie Corporation; Austin H. McCormick, Commissioner of Correction, New York City; Hilda W. Smith, Specialist in Workers' Education, Works Progress Administration; Alvin Johnson, Director, New School for Social Research; Spencer Miller, Jr., of the Workers Education Bureau; and Lena Madesin Phillips, Former President of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. John H. Finley, Editor Emeritus of the New York Times, will deliver the presidential address, and Morse A. Cartwright, Director of the Association, will present his annual report.

Check List For Family Size Vegetable Plot

What should be grown in the vegetable garden which is intended to produce a full supply of fresh food for the summer, and canned food for the winter?

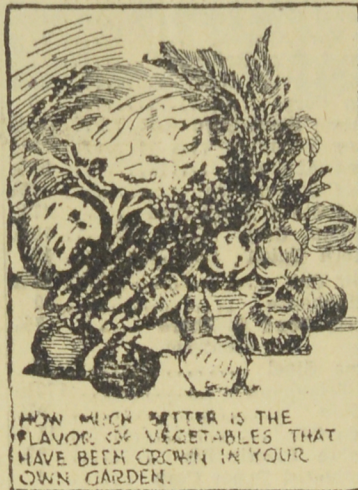
This naturally depends on the taste of the gardener and his family. The staple vegetable crops which should be considered, and grown if they are not disliked, include the following:

Eliminate as many of these as your family has not taste for, and if you have plenty of room add sweet corn.

One of the advantages of the home garden is that uncommon and hard to buy vegetables and seasoning aids can be grown. They need not take up as much space as your carrots or lettuce, but it is well to get acquainted with a few things every year, and get the benefit of the variety.

Choose some of the following as experiments. There is no need to allot much space to them this year unless you are sure they will be welcomed at mealtime: Brussels sprouts, a good fall crop; celery, broccoli, the green



sprouting types; Chinese cabbage for late salad materials; chicory, collards, corn salad, eggplant, celeriac for seasoning; cress, kale, kohrabi, leeks, melons, mustard greens, pumpkins, if you have the space; okra, salsify, squash, vegetable marrows, turnips and rutabagas. Among the herbs sage, thyme and majoram are easy to grow from seed.

Such a garden should be planned in advance, so that quantities of produce will mature as they can be used, and at seasons when the person in charge will have time to take care of them. It should also be planned so that many of the crops are grown for canning purposes, as well as for immediate use.

Two hours a day, three days a week is sufficient time to spend on such a project, and if this schedule is kept up throughout the season there will be few periods when any great amount of work is needed at one time.

WILL RECRUIT 'LAND ARMY'

LONDON, April 17.—Britain has decided to recruit immediately a women's land "army" to replace male farm workers and provide additional labor to increase home food production in case of war.

The ministry of agriculture, announcing the decision, said the new army would primarily be a mobile force ready to undertake all kinds of farm work in any part of the country.

In wartime volunteers in the women's land army would be assigned to travelling gangs for hay, corn and potato harvesting and other field work. Others would undertake dairying, care of livestock and operation of tractors and other farm machinery.

WINNING CONTRACT

By the Four Aces

(David Bruce Burnstone, Merwin D. Maier, Oswald Jacoby, Howard Schenken, world's leading team of four, inventors of the system that has beaten every other system in existence.)

TO DUCK OR NOT TO DUCK

East, Dealer
North-South vulnerable
North-South 60 on score
♠ K 6 5 2
♥ 10 9 5 4 3
♦ 6
♣ K 7 5
♠ Q 10 4 8
♥ A 8
♦ Q 10 9 7
♣ 5 2
♠ A J 8 7
♥ 2
♦ K J 3
♣ Q J 10
♠ 9
♥ K Q J 7 6
♦ A 8 4
♣ A 9 8 4

The bidding:
East South West North
1♠ 1♥ 2♦ 2♥
3♦ 3♥ Pass Pass
4♥ 4♠ Pass Pass
Pass 5♥ Dbl. Pass

East's and West's spirited defensive bidding finally got South a contract at which he should have been set. But the defense slipped a little and he made the hand.

The singleton club was opened. Declarer won with the Ace and laid down the Queen of hearts, whereupon West made mistake No. 1—he held off with the Ace. Now Declarer played the Ace and another diamond, trumping in dummy, and led a small spade. East made mistake No. 2: Fearing Declarer held the singleton Queen of spades, he went right up with the Ace and played the Queen of clubs. West discarded a club from his own hand, ruffed a spade, ruffed a diamond in dummy, ruffed the last spade and led a low heart.

West was now in the lead with the Ace and had to play another diamond, whereupon Declarer simply trumped in dummy and discarded the remaining losing club from his own hand.

The mistakes were rather unusual. West could have beaten the hand by playing his Ace on the first trump lead! East could have beaten the

hand by not playing his Ace on the first spade lead!
You were Declarer on Saturday at six clubs in a Rubber Bridge game. Dummy held:

♠ K Q 5
♥ Q 2
♦ A K J 3
♣ J 3 2
You held:
♠ A 8 3 2
♥ A K 5
♦ A K 6 5
♣ A Q 6 5

How do you play the trumps?
ANSWER: You can afford to lose one trump trick but not two. The correct play is to lay down the Ace of trumps and then play a low club towards the Jack. There is no play to make the hand if either opponent holds four trumps to the King. This play guards against a 4-1 split with the King being a singleton.

Score 100% for correct play, 0 for any other play.
