ARRANGEMENTS FOR DECORATIONS' ENTERTAINMENTS

Moves Follow Approval Fredericton's Plans For Occasion

Gala Celebration

Clubs And Societies Plan Dances And Other Affairs

Following Mayor C. Hedley Forbes' announcement Saturday that Fredericton's Royal Visit plans have been approved by Dr. E. H. Coleman, Under Secretary of State, and definite assurance that Their Majesties will visit Fredericton on June 13, private interests in the city are now going ahead with full zest in their preparations to make the day of the Royal Visit a gala event.

Details of the civic and government reception, including a visit to the Parliament Buildings and luncheon at the Beaverbrook Residence have already been announced.

To entertain the large throng of visitors to the city, who are expected to remain during the afternoon and evening, the city and various clubs and societies are now planning band concerts, dances, parties and various other forms of entertainment.

A mammoth fireworks display, said to be the largest ever seen in Fredericton, is planned for the evening as well as several band concerts, weather permitting. Material for the fireworks has already arrived in the city.

Five bands are expected to be in the city: two from Fredericton, two from Edmundston and one from Sackville.

All dance halls in the city are expected to be filled during the evening.

Decorating of private buildings in the city is also being considered now, with several decoration firms bidding for contracts to decorate the larger buildings.

Restaurants, hotels and other facilities to accommodate the large crowd expected, are preparing for the event which is now only about eight weeks away.

PARLIAMENT OF TUXIS GROUPS ENDED SATURDAY

Two Day Session Of House Proved To Be Success

The 1939 session of the Tuxis and Older Boys' Parliament which opened in this city on Friday afternoon, was prorogued at 9.30 on Saturday evening. At the concluding session a watch night service was conducted by Rev. John Linton. The service closed with the fellowship circle. Under the supervision of Harold Backisto the chairman of the Boys' Work Board, refreshments were served, and a sing-song brought the evening to a close.

The Parliament was formally opened on Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Speech From the Throne. Rev. John Linton acted as Lieutenant-Governor escorted by Reggie Colwell and Jack Stewart in their Scouts' uniforms. Donald Murray and Robert MacDiarmid were pages, and at different sessions Norris Menzies, Donald Hawker and Fraser MacKenzie acted as sergeants-at-arms. The Speaker's chair was occupied by Robert A. Watson.

At the opening session Neil Canter was clerk, during the other four sessions that position was held by Arthur Porrier, Linden Peebles, as Premier, was leader of the Construction Party, and Kenneth Mosher, as Deputy Premier, was leader of the Reconstruction party. 37 NEWSPAPERS ALREADY APPLY FOR N. B. COLUMN

Both Canadian And American Papers Book Feature

Miss Aida McCann And Byron M. Fisher To Supervise Booth

Thirty-seven newspapers in Canada and the United States have already booked the daily feature column on the New York World's Fair which is to be written by Byron M. Fisher, well known newspaperman and journalist of this city. Quick response was received for the column, since notices were only sent out from the Bureau of Information, which is sponsoring the column, on Wednesday last. One of the American papers is a large Boston daily.

Response in New Brunswick and Ten New Brunswick papers will use the column including The Daily Mail. Other places publishing the column will be: Nova Scotia, 6 papers; P. E. I., 1; Quebec, 4; Ontario 8 (including a large East Toronto daily); New Hampshire, 1; Vermont 1; Connecticut 1; Massachusetts 3.

It is expected that bookings will be received from other papers in various sections of the Dominion. The feature, it is stated, will have great publicity value to New Brunswick, since it will feature each day matters of wide interest concerning New Brunswick, as well as a complete coverage in the course of the series of the various exhibits and features at the fair.

The New Brunswick booth at the fair will be in charge of Miss Aida McCann and Mr. Fisher.

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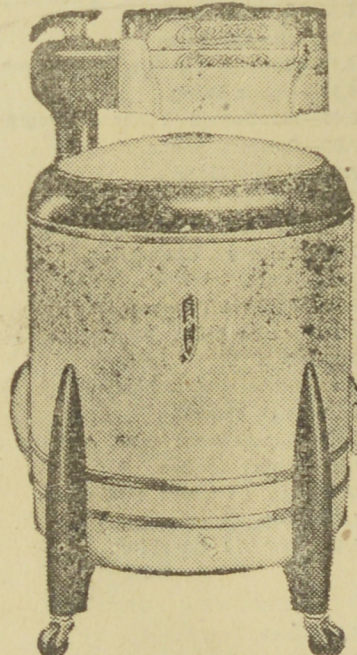
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
