Lanny Got Radio Start With Guitar

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 22—Lanny Ross has been unmasked at last. The popular NBC star, who has just returned to Captain Henry's Show Boat for the Thursday night broadcasts over an NBC-WEAF network after a month's vacation in Bermuda, has been masquerading for years as a tenor but now he admits he earned his first radio money as a guitar player. It all came out recently when he started taking lessons on the guitar. About six years ago Lanny was an undergraduate at Yale looking around for means of financing a law course. He took a try at radio and landed an assignment as a sustaining artist, a job which paid little or no money in those days. One day Lanny asked Raymond Knight, then a member of the NBC production staff, if he could use a good singer on a commercial program. Knight said he could not, but he did need a cowboy guitarist.

"I'm very good with the guitar," Ross lied and was hired. The singer-student never had touched a guitar but the broadcast was a week away. He purchased a \$6.00 secondhand instrument. A friend taught him one song which could be played with three chords. Ross reported to Knight, demonstrated his skill and threw in the vocals for nothing. He made good—and received \$20.00 for his deception.

James Melton, tenor star of "Music At the Haydn's" over NBC-WEAF on Monday nights, is planning a series of concert dates in South American capitals following the completion of his forthcoming Hollywood picture. Melton leaves for the coast on July 15.

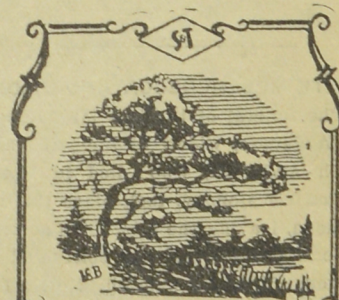
