## York County To Have Almost 14,000 Voters

(Continued from Page Eight) names of all or any number of candidates. The voter shall mark through or strike out the names of all except the name or names of the candidates for whom he wishes to vote. If there are more names not struck out than there are members to be elected, the ballot shall not be counted.

Section 101 permits the agent of each candidate to deposit in the polling compartments printed ballots bearing the names of the candidate or candidates, such ballots to be printed on white paper in black let-

ters only. The ballot, however, may be a piece of white paper having the names of the candidates written in black ink or black lead pencil. No ballot shall be respected by reason of the name or names of one or more candidates being printed and others being written or by reason of a name or names being marked through or struck out.
