New Regulations For N. B. Expected By July

### Area Reports

Dr. L. A. Donovan, Chairman, Saint John, Presides at Confer

Another meeting of the New Brunswick Dairy Products' Commission was held here today, sessions being held this morning and afternoon. Dr. L. A. Donovan, of Saint John, the chairman, presided, the others present being H. N. Flewelling, of Sussex, secretary; A. D. Freeze, of Penobscot; and K. W. Milner, of Moncton.

The Commission reported this morning that meetings have been held with milk dealers and producers in Saint John, Moncton, Sackville, Sussex and Chatham areas. The meeting here today is to consider the information derived from these various meetings with the producers and dealers and to complete and draw up regulations as applying to the respective areas. The secretary, Mr. Flewelling, stated this afternoon that the new regulations would be put into effect some time in July.

### JERSEY COW RECORDS

James Bremner, secretary of the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club, of this city, makes the announcement that the Jersey cow Longview Princess Ladybird, owned by Charles Robison & Sons, of Harvey Station, N. B., has been awarded a silver medal certificate by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club for her production of 7,701 pounds of milk, 471 pounds of fat, with an average test of 12 per cent in 305 days at two years and 288 days of age. Ladybird was bred by Thomas H. Lister, of Coburn, N. B. Woodland Melba, bred by Alton D. Lister, of Coburn, N.B., and owned by Corey Lewis, of Salisbury, N.B., has been awarded a silver medal certificate for her production of 5,965 pounds of milk 430 pounds of fat, with an average test of 6.17 per cent in 305 days at two years and 148 days of age.

## YORK COUNTY TO HAVE ALMOST FOURTEEN THOUSAND VOTERS MORE ON THURSDAY THAN IN 1927

Total Privileged to Vote This Year in This County Is 20,849, Final Figures—Fredericton City Will Have 6,056 Eligible—Franchise for Women Swells Voters Lists in Past Decade.

Final check-up of those eligible to vote in the county of York on Thursday's New Brunswick election discloses that since the year 1927 the voting list has been increased almost 14,000 voters. Major J. S. Scott, York county secretary-treasurer pointed out today that the granting of the franchise to women and population increase are attributable in large part to the growth. The total voting eligibles for the county on Thursday are 20,849, Major Scott stated. In 1927 there were only a little over 7,000 voters in the county.

Compilation of voters' list was completed this week. The returning officers and their deputies are engaged in the last minute preparations for polling at the various places in the county.

The voting list shows the following total of voters for each parish: Fredericton (Uptown and downtown) 5,215; Marysville, 987; Devon, 1173; New Maryland, 209; Kingsclear, 714; Manners-Sutton, 804; Dumfries, 288; McAdam, 1188; Canterbury, 1068; North Lake, 290; St. Marys, 1215; Douglas, 1671; Bright, 874; Queensbury, 589; Southampton, 1088; Stanley, 1487; Prince William, 380. To the above list have been added the following voters as follows:

Bright, 32; Canterbury, 42; Douglas, 67; Dumfries, 13; Kingsclear, 45; Manners-Sutton, 32; McAdam, 42; New Maryland, 4; North Lake, 21; Prince William, 13; Queensbury, 21; Stanley, 57; St. Marys, 93; Southampton, 81; Devon, 152; Fredericton 841; Marysville, 53.—Total 1,609.

The number of female voters this year almost approximates the number of male voters. In the first check-up there were in York County 9,782 male voters and 9,458 female voters. Since that time more than one thousand additions have been made to the list, and many of these are females.

Hon. W. H. Harrison, K.C., attorney general of the province, yesterday issued a warning with regard to the provisions of the Elections Act dealing with impersonation of voters and bribery and corrupt practices.

He pointed out that, with the revision of the voters' lists which have been brought up to date for this election, care must be exercised by the officials in charge of the various electoral districts to see that the same person's name does not appear in more than one sub-division of a district or in more than one ward in a city and that no person shall vote in the name of any person whose name appears on a list but who may be dead at the time of the election, or who may have married and gone to another district.

The attorney general drew attention to the penalties provided by section 113 of the act in the case of any person who applies for an envelope in the name of some other person, whether such name is that of a person living or dead, or of some fictitious person, and also in the name of any person who, having voted once at the election, applies at the same election for an envelope in his own name. Any person found violating this provision may be ordered detained and brought before a magistrate.

Attention was also called to section 164 where it is provided that any elector, who takes money or other reward and agrees therefor to vote or refrain from voting at the election, or corrupts or procures any person to give his vote, or intimidates any person to vote or refrain from voting, shall for every such act forfeit \$30

and be forever debarred from voting at any election.

### Liable to \$400 Fine

Section 165 stipulates that, if any sheriff, presiding officer, poll clerk, assessor, revisor, county secretary, parish officer or other person appointed or acting under the authority of the Election Act wilfully contravene or disobey any of the provisions of the act with respect to anything he is required to do and for which no specific penalty is provided, he shall be liable to a penalty of \$400.

The deputy returning officer of the districts have their attention directed to sections 116, 117 and 118 of the act. All ballot papers must be rejected when more than one ballot is found in an envelope when ballots are found in envelopes not supplied by the officer; when votes are given for more candidates than are to be elected; when there is any writing or mark on the ballot by which the voter could be identified, provided that no ballot shall be rejected on account of the name of any candidate being struck out or written thereon; and ballots which do not comply with sections 100 and 101.

Section 100 provides that on ballots shall be written or printed the

## R. C. M. P. SEIZE LIQUOR FILLED AUTO AT MINTO

Alyre Richard, of Minto, Fined \$500 and Given Six-month Term

### Prompt Conviction

Quantity of Alcohol and Rum in Seizure of Contraband

Alyre Richard of Minto was fined \$500 and given six months in jail, with an additional six months in default of payment when he appeared before Magistrate Baird of Chipman last night, only several hours after his car was confiscated by R.C.M.P. in the Minto area and a quantity of rum and alcohol seized.

Richard made no resistance when accosted by the police in the vicinity of Chipman. He was tried under the Intoxicating Liquor Act, Section 53-2 dealing with being in possession of liquor not purchased from the N. B. Liquor Control Board.

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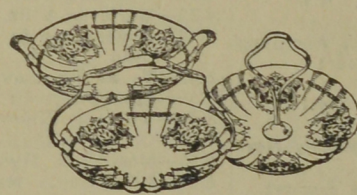
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
