## SALES CLINICS NEW ADVANCE AUTO INDUSTRY

Returning from the Montreal Motor Show, K. C., White of the Valley Motor Company, Limited, local Hudson-Terraplane distributors, told the Daily Mail that Hudson is introducing an important aid to service by staging special automobile clinics for sales and service representatives from coast to coast.

"A number of important advances have been registered", he said, "of which one which is attracting wide attention is the electric hand, Hudson's pre-selective device which eliminates the actual work of gear-shifting. It operates by vacuum energy and is optional on all models of the line. The rotary equalizing braking system is new this year and also the welded steel roofs, part of the steel unit-construction which Hudson has emphasized for some time. Air cushion tires are now standard. The cooling system has been improved. The electrical systems are oversize and the new automobile radios on the Hudson line have separate high output speakers and tube antennae. Two engineering accomplishments have greatly increased the horse-power without changing either bore or stroke. The breathing capacity of the motor has been increased and there is an improved tappet design. The pinned piston rings are now topped by a heat diffusing band which is a great oil saver. Doors and windows are wind and weather sealed and the flatter rear springs improve both appearance and riding qualities".

Mr. White said that Hudson Motors of Canada, Limited, are to put on this clinic at the Admiral Beatty, Saint John, for the New Brunswick dealers on Thursday of this week.

## "TUMBLEBUG" BARES LOVE HURT

## Sues Harvester Company Official's Widow for Breach of Promise

CHICAGO, Feb. 4—Rotund Robert Isaacson, who thinks the wealthy Mrs. Mary Alexander should pay him \$100,000 for the love she didn't give him, came back to testify in the Circuit Court today, to entertain further all the stenographers that courthouse officers could spare from duty.

Isaacson, whom Mrs. Alexander termed "Tumblebug" in endearing notes, written during three years of courtship, kept the typist snickering for three hours yesterday.

Listening to the little liquor dealer's tremulous account of the days when Mrs. Alexander, widow of a former executive of the International Harvester Company, called him "Dearest Ufus" and he called her "Salami," thought it funny when he lamented that "four times she proposed marriage, and then canceled plans the night before."

Isaacson is suing Mrs. Alexander for breach of promise.

He chided the jammed courtroom with a glance from sad brown eyes when a gale of laughter followed reading of a telegram from Mrs. Alexander in which she said:

"Thanks, Tumblebug, let's sell birthday seashells by the seashore. Love Salami."

Fumbling his coat collar, Isaacson explained that such messages constituted an invitation from Mrs. Alexander for him to visit her immediately in her luxurious hotel home.

He buried his head in his hands but found room to peek at the jury when his attorney read a letter addressed to "Dearest Ufus," and signed "Salami Herring."

"You are the sweetest boy I ever knew," Mrs. Alexander said in the note.

"Salami Herring," Isaacson explained was a particularly effective form of endearment.

He said Mrs. Alexander proposed marriage and persuaded him "over my protests," that he should abandon his business, spent \$4,000—"all I had"—and depend on her to make me rich." He did, he said, and then "she failed me."

Mrs. Alexander, he said, is about 45." He is 37.

Mrs. Alexander is ignoring the trial. She is in Florida and intends to stay there.

## TRAMPS AN AID TO GEOGRAPHY

London, Feb. 4—Adopt a "tramp" and learn geography without tears is a novel idea about which much was heard at the annual conference of the Geographical Association just held at the London School of Economics.

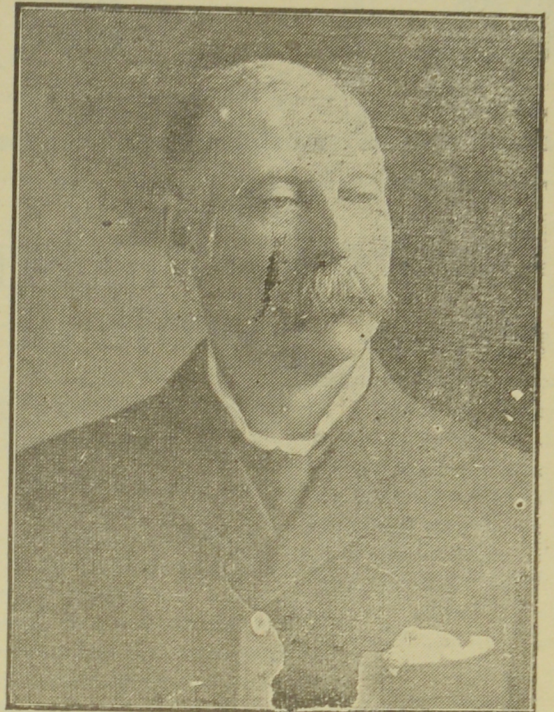
The tramp under discussion was, of course, the cargo vessel and not the weary Willy, although some persons attending the conference thought the latter often knew a good deal about geography.

For some years past a number of teachers in elementary schools in Britain have sought to make the study of Geography more attractive by having the pupils follow fixed shipping routes in their lessons. But Lord Sandon, himself a ship-owner, believes a better way is to have the schools adopt a tramp ship, an experiment which has proved most successful with his own children, and which he has encouraged four London schools to try.

Those who adopt a tramp are given a picture of the ship, and then follow it throughout its voyage. The captain and officers write letters to the pupils from the ports visited, and when the ship returns home the pupils go aboard and subject the skipper and his mates to an intensive questioning about the voyage and the places visited.

Lord Sandon is anxious to have the experiment extended to schools all over the country, and a committee of the Geographical Association will now draw up a scheme embodying his adoption idea, which it was said, might be a stunt if badly done, but if properly worked out "might play an important part in geographical education."

## Old Times Recalled



HON. E. H. ALLEN

"Ned Allen was a son of the late Sir John C. Allen, a former Chief Justice. He was a member of one of Fredericton's oldest families. Like Sir John Allen and all of his sons, Ned Allen was personally popular with everyone in Fredericton. In his younger days he was prominent in all kinds of sport. He was a curler of note; a member of the old Saint Ann's Boat Club; of the Cricket Club and of various other organizations.

For several years Mr. Allen was in the Coal and Commission business. In 1896 he contested York county for the Dominion House running against the late Sir George Foster who was then Minister of Finance. Mr. Allen was defeated but his party was successful in the elections. He shortly after received the appointment of claims agent on the old I.C.R. with headquarters at Moncton. He remained at Moncton until 1908 when he resigned his position to become Provincial Secretary in the government of Hon. C. W. Robinson (now Senator Robinson). The Robinson government was defeated in the Province and Mr. Allen also met defeat in York County. He then took up farming at Springhill where he continued to reside until a short time before his death when he returned to this city. Other sons of Sir John Allen and brothers of Ned Allen were Dr. T. C. Allen, Registrar of the Supreme Court, George W. Allen, K.C., and W. K. Allen both of whom were former members of the legislature and an older brother Capt. John Allen who followed the sea. All have passed away. Old timers in Fredericton as well as those who are now scattered in other parts will have a kindly remembrance of the Allens.

E. H. Allen died about ten years ago.

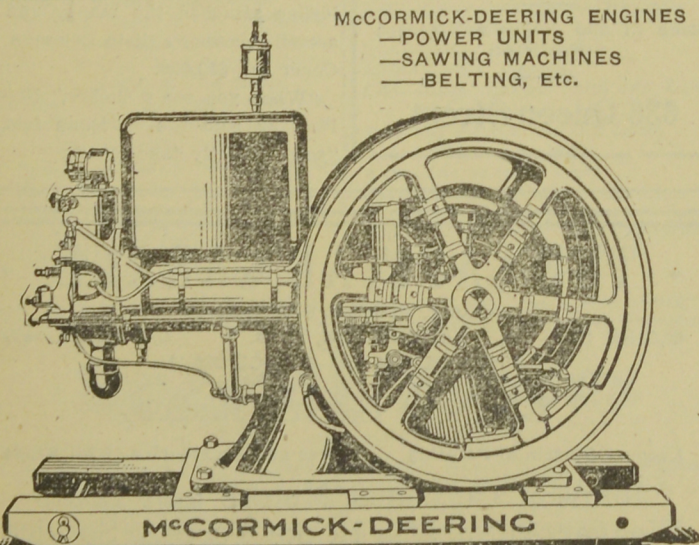
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
