## Hauptmann Appeals For Defense Funds

almost as deep as that in the court room. The "Plaza" fronting the Court House and the Union Hotel, which was the social headquarters throughout the trial, looked like Times Square at the end of an election night.

The townspeople were happy that it was over—and yet a little regretful that the excitement had come to an end. The trial was a boon to the town. Visitors have left at least \$100,000 in the tills of the hotel men, restaurant owners, rooming house keepers, and private citizens who turned their spare rooms into accommodations for the visitors.

Sheriff John H. Curtiss announced today that Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted Lindbergh kidnap murderer, would be removed from the Hunterdon County jail to the death house in State Prison sometime today.

"We are going to take him down today. That's definite."

Now that Bruno Richard Hauptmann has been convicted of the murder of his son, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has only to wait until Hauptmann's appeal is done before \$14,600 of the \$50,000 he paid over for his son's return is given back to him.

DRESDEN, Germany, Feb. 16—An appeal in person by Frau Pauline Hauptmann, mother of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, to Gov. Harold G. Hoffman of New Jersey was suggested today by Fritz Hauptmann, brother of the man convicted to death for the Lindbergh kidnapping.

Hearing of an offer to Hauptmann's sister in California of \$25,000 for a vaudeville tour, Fritz suggested that the money might enable Frau Hauptmann to visit the Governor and personally present a plea for mercy.

Fritz is a tailor. Business has been so bad recently, however, that he has been selling newspapers and he read of his brother's death sentence as he

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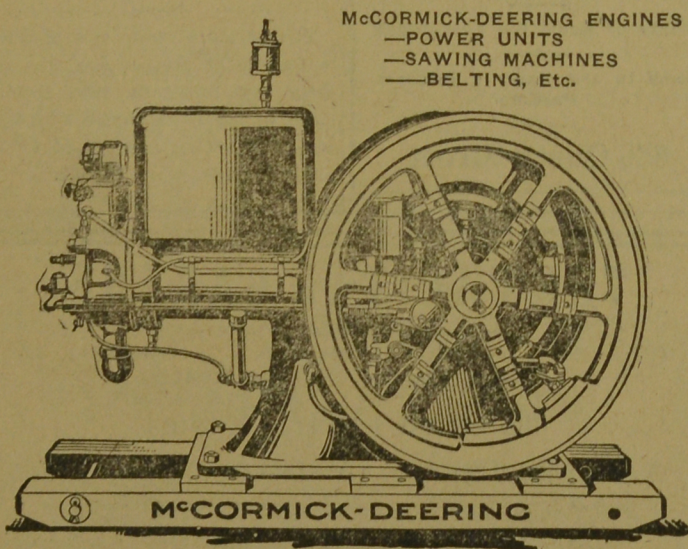
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
