



Today's market at Phoenix Square. was a large one with many farmers in. The weather being mild probably accounted for the increased number of farmers arriving for the week-end market. Prices were practically unchanged from the last several weeks though chickens sold for slightly higher price. Chicken sold for 28 to 30 cents per pound. Eggs remained steady at 25 cents per dozen. In one corner of the market a farmer was selling clams for 20 cents; scollops. 35 cents; and oysters, 45 cents. The other prices were as follows: Butter 25 cents per pound; wood, \$2 to \$8 per cord; potatoes, 75 cents per barrel; pork, 10 to 14 cents per pound; beef, 4 to 6 cents per pound; lamb, 14 to 16 cents per pound.


