### MAYOR CLARK'S RELIGION

That a man who calls himself respectable stands upon the public platforms in school houses throughout these joint counties and makes a canvass against the Liberal candidate for York-Sunbury because he happens to be a "Christian and a deacon of the Baptist Church," and because "he uses a groaning tone as he offers prayer," is disgraceful and is poor ethics. This is absolutely what happened and the remarks which were taken down by a stenographer and are now in possession of Mr. Clark, were made by a man supporting the Conservative candidate, and a man who should know better.

What a man's religion is or where he worships on Sunday is a matter between himself and his God, and we are stooping pretty low when this is made the matter of discussion on the public platform. This is not the first time that religion was brought up by the Tory party in York county. We thought that this was settled last Summer once and for all. But if it is going to be an issue, bring it out in the open.

W. G. Clark has all his life been a prominent and consistent member of the Baptist Church. He is a deacon of the church and he has filled positions of trust in his denomination.

Mr. Clark is not like some of those who criticise him. He does not leave his Christianity on the back seat of the church when he comes out. He carries his religion—as more of us should do—into his everyday life and he and his family circle have been an example to others as possessing a Christian home with influence for good.

While all can not see alike in religion, all Christians are doing their part, and it is pretty rotten stuff to criticise adversely any man who tries to worship his God as he sees fit and as he has a right to do. There is one thing for which the Liberal candidate should be admired above all else and that is for his Christian principles and the bringing of them into his every day life.

Talk such as this will not hurt Mayor Clark. It will kick back upon those who are making this canvass. Our experience with deacons and others of Mr. Clark's denomination is that they stand four-square, and are straight and true to the limit. There are hundreds of good Tory Baptists who will resent this kind of an attack on their church and on its officers.

The Daily Mail has a personal regard for all three candidates. They are all good men. It is too bad that they have to differ in regard to politics. That however, is natural. But leave out personalities, and where a man hangs his hat on Sunday. This stuff is too small for our noble country. One slimey devil tried this last summer.
