the realization of his boyhood ambition, of the sterling quality of his predecessors in such a high office. He hoped to measure up to that high standard of perfection which characterized those men of the past. In acknowledging the tribute to his ability and to the realization of his ambition the Chief Justice took cognizance of how largely accident, chance and circumstance affect human life. In this connection he noted many legal minds called by death before the realization of their ambitions. "I can try to be fair and just," he said, "and to give my best work."

Concluding Chief Justice Baxter declared that he appreciated the honor accorded to him by the Barristers' Society and stated he hoped that "this bench would always be a place of
