

## CHIEF JUSTICE BAXTER ACCORDED HONOR TODAY

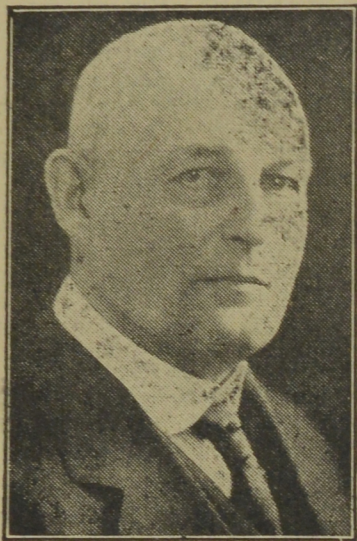
His Portrait Placed in

C. F. Inches, K.C., Makes

The portrait of Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter was hung on the walls of the Supreme Court Chamber here today alongside other New Brunswick legal immortals, the ceremony being a most impressive one and witnessed by a large number of the members of the New Brunswick Barristers' Society, and many others.

C. F. Inches, K.C., of Saint John, president of the Society on behalf of the Society extended to Chief Justice Baxter high compliment paying tribute to his genius on the Bench with the words and expressed, as he said,

It was announced at the regular monthly meeting of the Victoria Hospital board last evening. It was further announced at the meeting that the New Brunswick Hospital Association will hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday of this week in the council chamber at the city hall. His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark presided at last night's meeting. The month of August was a busy month with a daily average of patients 29.26. The superintendent's report showed the following statistics: number of patients in hospital at beginning of month, 47; number of patients admitted during month, 120; number of patients discharged, 135; number of patients at end of month, 32; number of medical cases admitted, 17; surgical cases, 92; obstetrical cases, 7; births, 4; deaths, 3; major operations, 28; minor operations, 62; x-ray examinations, 32; x-ray treatments, 7; maximum number of patients in one day, 49; minimum number in one day, 30.

## LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR PAYING OFFICIAL VISIT TO EXHIBITION; RECORD FIRST DAY ATTENDANCE

Fine Program Arranged  
for Fredericton's Big  
Fair Today, Although  
Rain Threatens—Rac-  
ing Starts This After-  
noon — Bicycle Races  
Popular and Are to be  
Made Yearly Event.

While rain seemed not too far off, Fredericton's 1935 exhibition advanced to its second day today with prospects of a continuation of the first day's success. Yesterday proved from point of attendance to be a larger opening day than last year, which is taken as a good omen by the directors.

His Honor Lieutenant Governor Dr. Murray MacLaren paid an official visit to the fair grounds this morning at eleven o'clock and was escorted about the grounds and through the buildings. He was expected to attend the opening's races this afternoon at the Trotting Park.

This morning was observed as Ayrshire day with many being present, including His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor. Premier Dysart is expected to attend the exhibition later in the week.

The directors were impressed with the opening day's success. The general public jammed the grandstand at the race track last evening to witness the open air attractions, which proved to be the finest seen here in years. Particularly impressive was the Five Juggling Jewels, a juggling act done by five beautiful girls. The agility and color of this act is marvellous. The other acts are also up to a higher standard than ever before.

### Bike Races Were Splendid

One of the most attractive items on the card yesterday was the bicycle racing program for the kiddies. It is planned by the directors to make this an annual event for Children's Day. The prize winners as announced by the committee in charge was as follows:

Half-mile, under 100 pounds—Bud Hatfield, Raymond Savage, Harry Harrison, Osborne Mooers. Time 1.35 (two elimination heats were necessary).

One mile, over 125 pounds—Maurice Morgan, Richard O'Rea, Robert Olive Arthur Boone. Time, 2.49.

### Judging Underway

Judging is now underway in all departments of the exhibition. The various exhibits are receiving a great deal of attention, particularly the gaily decorated booths of the merchants in the main building. As last year the maple sugar industry is represented, and M. L. Dunphy of Royal Road, president of the N. B. Maple Sugar Producers' Association has an appealing exhibit of syrup, vinegar, sugar and cream.

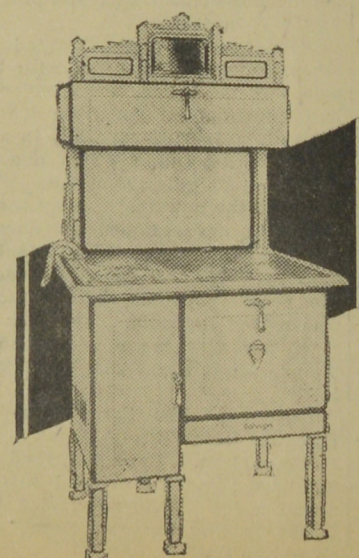

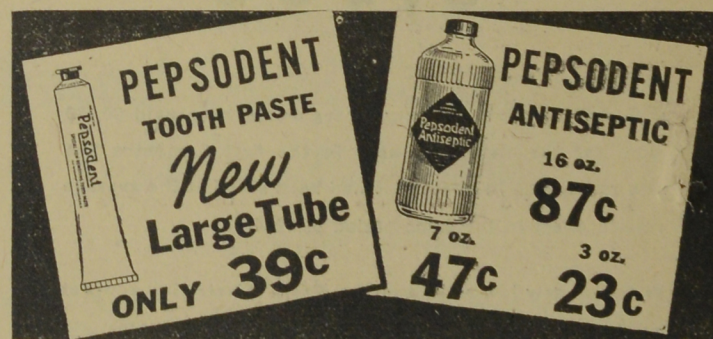
