

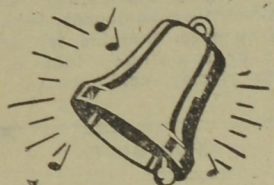

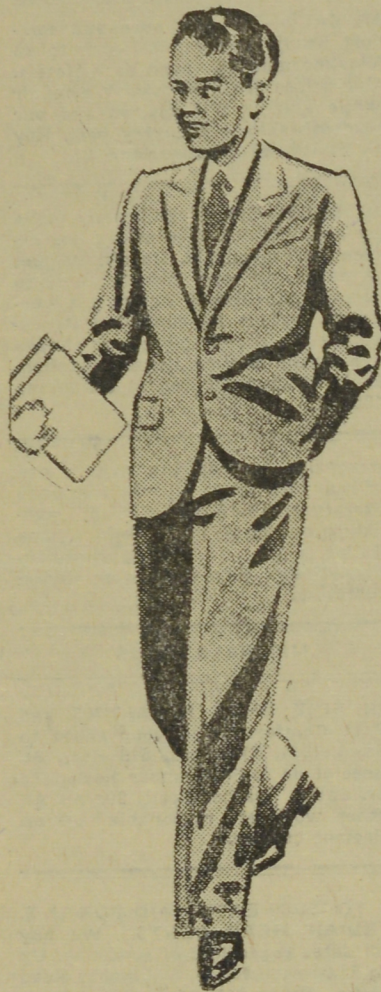

Phil Edwards, Great Negro Runner to Participate in 1000 Metres Race.

MONTREAL, Aug. 29—Phil Edwards will run in the 1,000 metres race at Canadian National Exhibition on Saturday.

It is the tenth consecutive C. N. E. meet in which Phil has competed, and this time he will match strides with American and Canadian stars, including Chuck Hornbostel and possibly Glenn Cunningham. Edwards has been training for the past two weeks and reports himself in fair shape. He has been employed as a playgrounds supervisor this summer and this has helped him keep in trim. He leaves for Toronto on Friday and will wear McGill colors in the race.

The race was sailed under a fine northwesterly breeze. Yankee gained command at the start and held it all the way. T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavor was third.

NEW CHALLENGER FOR THE AMERICA YACHT CUP

TORQUAY, England, Aug. 29—C. R. Fairey, wealthy yachting enthusiast and airplane manufacturer, may be the next challenger for the America's Cup.

Yachtsmen have understood Fairey has about decided to try his luck with a new "K" craft of 110 tons, the next size smaller than the "J" class boats such as T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavor.

Fairey, who recently was elected

Commodore of the Royal London Yacht Club, witnessed the cup races last year and is believed to have made up his mind at that time to make a try for the cup. British yachtsmen have been trying to win the trophy ever since 1851.

The plans of Sopwith are believed to hinge upon what Fairey eventually decides. Sopwith has started drafting plans for a new Endeavor but may scrap them if Fairey should enter the list.

BROCKTON TO HAVE BIG RACE PROGRAM SOON

BOSTON, Aug. 29—Harness racing will have its inning at the Brockton Fair this year, races of the trotting speedsters being scheduled for Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the big fair, which opens Sept. 8 and closes Sept. 14.

This year a new plan will be followed by which every heat is a complete race. This gives nine dashes or complete races on the card each of the three afternoons named and affords plenty of opportunity for some exciting finishes and some real enthusiasm on the part of those who follow harness racing.

There is extreme rivalry among owners or harness racers and this will be given full vent at the Brockton Fair, where the word has been passed along to let all "grudge" fights be permitted full swing.

Among the owners and trainers heavy wagers are placed on the result of these races, and the results are stirring dashes for the first place money.

Adequate purses have been offered to attract some of the best harness horses in this section.

DEVON LOSES 7-3 IN FINAL WITH KIWANIS

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., August 30—Fully 2,500 fans saw the St. Stephen-Milltown Kiwanis, Maritime champions, hammer their way into the New Brunswick baseball finals here last night when they poled out a 7-3 victory over the Devon nine in a replay of the third and final game of the semi-finals. Devon had won a protest over the Kiwanis in the third game played here last Friday when they alleged that the champions had used a player not registered with the New Brunswick Baseball Association making a replay necessary.

A third inning splurge by Kiwanis which netted them three runs gave them a marginal win over the Devonites to that stage of play as they had scored a run in the last of the first. They scored three more the York County champions tallied their other two in the eighth after scoring a lone tally in the first.

By their victory Kiwanis now enter the final series with the Trumps. No dates have been named apart from the first two games, the opener to be played here this (Friday) afternoon at 3 P. M., and the second game in Saint John Monday.

Both teams will be idle over the week-end giving them a chance to rest their ace hurlers Brownell (Kiwans) and Morrell (Trumps).
