

SWINE FIELD DAY AT AULAC BIG ATTRACTION

C. F. Bailey and L. Griesbach Left Here To Attend Meeting

N. S., N. B. Represented

Feeding of Market Hogs One of Significant Discussion Matter

C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, and Leonard Griesbach left today for Aulac, N. B., where they will attend the meeting of the New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Swine Breeders' Association meeting taking place there today.

The meeting is one of the most important swine breeders' meeting ever held in the Maritime Provinces and the discussions will center around the use of protein supplements, especially interesting to the farmers situated in the potato areas.

Other things of great interest which will be dealt with today include the problem of feeding market hogs, and the system of Advanced Registry in hogs. Swine feeding experiments of recent years demonstrate that young pigs can be fed without the use of milk provided protein supplements such as fish meal and tankage, are used in proper proportions.

Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick and Hon. J. A. MacDonald, Minister of Agriculture for Nova Scotia, will be special speakers today. S. E. Todd, of Toronto, will also be a speaker. The importance of increasing the swine population is before the meeting today with the probability of considerable discussion on it.

To date the Grievies' pen has accumulated 2,550.6 points. The Grievies pen led for the week ending August 28 with 304.4 points and W. A. Sanson's pen was second, and John Woods' pen third.

CONDITION STILL SERIOUS

The condition of David Jones, Fredericton carpenter, who was found in his yard on Aberdeen Street shortly after eight o'clock yesterday morning with a bullet wound in his chest presumably self-inflicted, was reported to be unchanged this afternoon at the Victoria Hospital. The physician who attended Jones reports his condition to be serious. Ill-health is believed to have been the cause of Jones' alleged action.

A GENEROUS RESPONSE TO FIRE-STRICKEN

Charitable Work Done by Province, Red Cross, Other People

Donations Large

A Hundred New Homes To Be Built in Tracadie Area

T. A. MacDonald, Superintendent of Colonization for New Brunswick, who was in the city last evening states that there has been widespread and generous response to the charitable work of assisting homeless settlers, many of whom were burned out of their homes in the recent devastation by forest fires in the province.

Business firms in this province and outside have contributed, Mr. MacDonald states. Many of the donations have been very generous. Mr. MacDonald left again today for Tracadie where he will continue his work of conducting relief operations for the stricken ones.

A total of one hundred new homes will be built in the Tracadie vicinity. About eighteen of these will be built on settlers' lots and others on homesteads.

The Red Cross Society of this province contributed valuable assistance in recent weeks and have relieved much suffering and misery by their work. They have furnished food supplies and clothing. In many places the homeless ones were quartered in tents and the homes of friends.

REQUEST FOR FRANCHISE CITY BUS SERVICE

Special Meeting of City Council at 4 p.m. to Consider It

Plan Three Buses

W. E. Vaughan and C. N. Goodspeed Form Capital Bus Company

The city council is holding a special meeting at four o'clock this afternoon to consider the request of the Capital Bus Company for a franchise to operate a bus service exclusively in this city.

The Capital Bus Company has been formed by W. E. Vaughan and ex-Ald. C. N. Goodspeed of this city for the purpose of carrying on a regular bus service in this city, the plan being to have three of such buses in operation and to cover the entire city. The franchise requested calls for operation solely in this city.

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark arrived in the city early this afternoon by auto from Moncton and will preside at this afternoon's special meeting of the council.

If a franchise is granted the three buses to be put in operation will carry on complete coverage of the city and will have regular hours and reasonable prices. The proposed bus service for this city has nothing to do with the similar passenger bus service which has been discussed recently in Devon and Marysville.

TENDERS FOR COAL

MARYSVILLE MEN THREATENED WITH REVOLVER

Charles 'Totty' Simpson of Sandyville Brandishes Pistol

Is Ill Mentally

Coun. Rowley Manzer Persuades Man to Put Away Gun

Brandishing a fully loaded automatic pistol, Charles "Totty" Simpson of Sandyville, threatened to shoot Harry Peterson and Councillor Rowley Manzer at Marysville yesterday morning.

Simpson, who has allegedly been mentally unbalanced for a number of years, for no apparent reason struck Robert Arnold, 14 year old son of Town Marshal Arnold, a severe blow in the face and upon the interference of Harry Peterson, he suddenly drew a pistol from his coat pocket and threatened him. The threatened man retreated hastily with Simpson following him, still flourishing the gun.

Councillor Rowley Manzer heard the commotion which took place in the rear of the Simpson store at Sandyville and hastened to find out the trouble. He also was threatened by Simpson. Councillor Manzer calmly talked to Simpson and persuaded him to put the gun away and go home.

Town Marshal Harry Arnold was summoned and with R.C.M.P. constables he went to the Simpson home, where the man offered no resistance. He was taken into custody and was brought to this city, where after examination he was taken to the Provincial Hospital at Saint John for treatment.

According to Town Marshal Arnold, Simpson had chased Ralph Estabrooks, another Marysville resident, some time ago, with a stick of wood.

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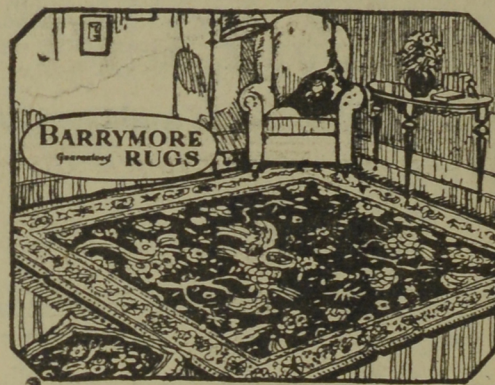
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
