M. P. Harrison Spoke on
Subject of Rose and
Its Development

Discussion Held

William Kesson Elected
President of Club for
Ensuing Year

The eighteenth annual meeting of the Fredericton Science Club was held at the home of J. Brown Maxwell, 868 George Street, with 25 members and guests being present last night.

The speaker of the evening was Maynard P. Harrison, who contributed much information on the history of the rose and its development. Known from time immemorial as "Queen of the Flowers", the rose is given a wealth of mythology as well as reference in the Bible and much classical literature.

The rose is the national flower of England and has been used as symbolical of silence—hence the phrase "sub rosa".

After Mr. Harrison's talk some discussion of rose varieties and their cultivation was indulged in the meeting and a note of thanks was passed and tendered the speaker.

MARYSVILLE TO HAVE ELECTIONS IN TWO WARDS

John Fletcher and Howard O'Donnell Will
Offer Opposition

Nomination Day

Mayor J. Walter Walker
Likely To Be Mayor
For Fifth Time

Elections in two wards was anticipated today for the town of Marysville as nomination day arrived and two newcomers to town politics filed their papers. John Fletcher will oppose Alderman Horace Pettigrew in Ward one and Howard O'Donnell will oppose William Moore in Ward three. Election day is next Saturday.

Ald. Richard Gorman in Ward two, and Ald. Marvin Minue in Ward four will accept office by acclamation in the two other aldermanic posts it was expected late this afternoon.

Nominations close at six o'clock this evening.

Mayor J. Walter Walker has again filed nomination papers and seems likely to be elected by acclamation as no opposition has yet appeared. Mayor Walker has already served four consecutive years as mayor of the township of Marysville.

There has been considerably more interest manifest this year in town politics in Marysville than during the past few years and is taken as a sign of a revival in the affairs of the town. The four aldermen whose terms on the board will not expire until next year are Irvine Gregory in Ward one; Charles Fennimore in Ward two; Roy Moore in Ward three; and Carl Sloat in Ward four.

Damage by Fire On King Street Amounts to \$500

Damage caused by fire at the King street building owned by David Gorman which broke out yesterday afternoon, amounted to about \$500 it was reported from the fire station this morning. The fire originated from electric wiring or from the back of the stove in the kitchen of the upper flat, which was occupied by Morris Lang. The lower flat is occupied by Max Budovitch.

Firemen fought the blaze for over an hour before it was controlled. The fighters were under the handicap of having to force the doors as no one was in at the time and the huge quantities of smoke made fire fighting difficult. The fire was rung in from Box 17. Investigation of the outbreak was made today by Assistant fire chief, Ed. King.

Week-End Market

EMPLOYMENT DEPARTMENT FOR U. N. B.

Idea of Employment Bureau For Grads Will
Be Developed

To Act Immediately

Registrar Says Students
In Arts Will Benefit
More

An employment bureau or service for graduating students of the University of New Brunswick was drafted last night at a meeting of the Associated Alumni of the University which was held last night in Saint John. Joseph W. Sears, registrar of U. N. B., has been appointed to put the scheme into operation and organize for its effectiveness.

J. W. Sears told a Mail reporter today that the endeavor under this new scheme will be "to open up new fields to our graduates," and that attempts will be made to place every graduate in some employment. The accent will be on the Arts graduate and the Bachelor of Science in Arts, since already there exists contact with the larger concerns for the graduates in engineering and forestry.

Action will be immediate, the registrar states, and organization of a staff to carry on the work will also be carried out within a short time. The scheme is patterned after that carried on at Queen's University and at Col-


