

COUNTY OFFICIALS UNDECIDED RE ACCIDENT SCENE

Investigating Now To
Discover Where Vic-
tim Leaped

Costs Involved

Undecided as to Wheth-
er Accident Was in
County or City

An investigation is being carried on by the Municipality of York to determine whether the accident causing the death of Wardlow Amos, who died as a result of injuries received as he jumped from a truck on Hanwell Road, occurred in the City of Fredericton. Major J. S. Scott, secretary-treasurer of the County, announced this morning. If the accident occurred beyond the city limits the county is required to pay the costs of the coroner and other costs in connection with the case, but if the accident occurred within the city limits the City of Fredericton is responsible for the costs.

It is said that the City limit line runs along the city side of the fox ranch owned by Percy Gerow. According to information from those who investigated the accident Amos leaped from the truck at a point above Gerow's ranch. But, according to the officials, there is no hill for quite a distance beyond the fox ranch and therefore the truck could not have been running wild. The County has paid the coroner's fee but the investigation is being carried on to determine whether or not the County is required to pay any of the costs or not, said the secretary-treasurer today.

The minimum wholesale and retail price for milk sold in the Hartland area shall be as follows:—Quarts, retail 8 cents, wholesale 7 cents; pints, retail 4 cents, wholesale 3 1-2 cents; half-pints, retail 2 cents.

Barristers' Soc. Council
Considers Petitions
of Law Students

Several Discussions

Amendments to Barris-
ers' Society Act Dis-
cussed at Length

At this month's sitting of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick two local young men and a Woodstock man will be recommended to be admitted as solicitors, it was decided at the quarterly meeting of the New Brunswick Barristers' Society Council. Those recommended by the council meeting, presided over by C. F. Inches, K. C., Saint John, were Drury Anderson and Horace Hanson Fredericton and Frank Creighton, Woodstock.

The council also dealt with a petition for the admission of six students at law. They were J. R. Dumas, J. D. Boudreau, W. R. Tippet, G. R. Burke, J. P. Lemenage and A. S. McPhail.

The council discussed at length the proposed amendments to the tariff of costs and the proposed amendments to the Barristers' Society Act for protection of the law profession against unlicensed practitioners. They also discussed the proposed amendments to the act with reference to unlicensed practitioners appearing before the judge or registrar of the bankruptcy court.
