Kate will continue as the starring performer on the series, assisted by the Three Ambassadors, the Wallace Sisters and Jack Miller's Orchestra.

Tonight, she will combine old and new in rhythm and ballads. She will sing the ever-popular "Mood Indigo" "I Surrender, Dear," featured on her CBS debut almost four years ago. Her other songs are "Blow Gabriel Blow" and "It's Easy to Remember." The trio and orchestra will be heard in "About a Quarter to Nine" and "By the Great Horn Spoon."

## Coast Hook-up For New "Speech" Time

CHICAGO, April 8—"Your English" distinctive NBC program dramatizing the power of the spoken word, will be brought to radio listeners at a new hour beginning Sunday, April 14.

On that date, and weekly thereafter the broadcasts, which are sponsored by the Better Speech Institute of America, will be heard over a coast-to-coast NBC-WJZ network at 3.00 p.m. A.S.T. Heretofore the programs have been broadcast at 12.45 p.m., A.S.T., over the same network and have been heard only in the East and Middle West.

Selected radio dramatic artists are heard on the programs which feature in addition, the music of Leon Lightfeld and his Rondoliers and two well known announcers—Louis Roen of the NBC Chicago staff, and Phil Stewart, heard frequently over NBC networks from Chicago.
