

NO SIGN YET OF BREAK-UP THOUGH WEATHER WARMS

Hot Sun and the Higher Temperature Likely to Melt River Covering

No Rise in Water

Considerable Snow and Ice in Woods Hinders Stream-drivers

While the river level remained almost unchanged over the last forty-eight hours, a hot sun and higher temperature today indicated that the thaw was on the way. At the present time the ice in the river is thick and strong, about 36 inches in thickness, and there is a large quantity of snow on top. The arrival of the warmer weather will mean a rapid dissipation of this snow and ice.

John Malloy, engineer at the pumping station said today that there had been no material rise in the water and it is now about three feet above summer level. It will have to rise much higher than that before the ice will be broken up, the engineer declared.

In the meantime the large amount of snow and ice in the woods and along the streams is causing some trouble to the woodsmen intent on getting their logs to the water's edge for stream driving. These operations are in full swing at the present time.

The change in the weather over the weekend witnessed a rise in the temperature here from 20 degrees to 55 degrees Fahrenheit. Sidewalks and streets in this city are becoming free of ice and snow and the capital is at last taking on the appearance of spring.

CHANGES IN FISHERY LAWS NOW IN EFFECT

L. H. Parks, Fishery Supervisor, Says Changes Effective March 30

Prosecutions

William Sapier, Henry Sullivan, of Tobique, Apprehended

L. H. Parks, district fishery supervisor, today announced changes in the Dominion fishery laws, affecting this province, and which came into effect on March 30. He also announced prosecutions against William Sapier and Henry Sullivan, Indians, of Tobique Narrows, both of whom were apprehended for fishing salmon contrary to law on July 24, 1934. Both were found guilty on April 2, 1935, and Sapier was given 20 days' jail, and Sullivan 30 days.

The fishery changes were made through order-in-council, P.C. 827, Section 34 of the Fisheries Act. The changes are as follows:

Gaspereaux

In fishing gaspereaux in untitled waters the nets shall not exceed 10 fathoms in depth and the type of net and the method of operating it shall be subject to the approval of the district supervisor.

Salmon

The use of a gaff for landing salmon by anglers previous to May 24th in each year is prohibited.

Shad

In untitled waters of the Southwest Miramichi River, shad fishing with dip nets only shall be permissible under permit from the district supervisor from sunrise to sunset on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week from the 1st-20th June each year, both dates inclusive, but such fishing shall be restricted to places in the river that shall be specified by the district supervisor.

Smelts

Smelt bag and box net fishing shall be permissible from Dec. 1st in each year to the 15th day of Feb. following. Both dates inclusive, provided that chief supervisor may authorize smelt bag and box net fishing to begin at any time after Nov. 24th in each year, provided that the weather be cold enough to freeze the smelt at that time.

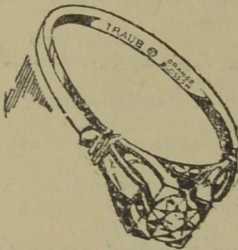

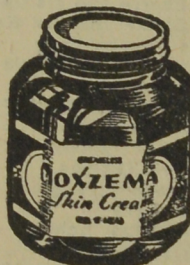
