## Former Wheat King In Jubilee Broadcast

In one of its several special Jubilee programs on May 6th, the Radio Commission will bring to the microphone and coast-to-coast network Canada's famous former "Wheat King", during the twenty-five years of his Dr. Seager Wheeler, of Rosthern, Saskatchewan. He will be heard in the program, "Canada in 1935" which goes on from 12:00 Noon to 1:30 P. M., A. S. T.

Famous throughout the world for the championship wheat that he has grown, the story of Seager Wheeler's program, the Columbia's network will life in Western Canada is one of resourcefulness and pluck, not unaccompanied by disappointment and temporary failure, and finally rewarded with a large measure of success. Emigrating to Canada from the Isle of Wight in 1885, when but a boy of sixteen, his achievements in producing strains of wheat adapted to Western Canada conditions have made him one of the Dominion's outstanding settlers. He is the only man who had the distinction of being crowned "world wheat king" five times, having won the title for championship wheat in 1911, 1914, 1915, 1916 and 1918. In addition to wheat awards Seager Wheeler has captured many prizes for oats and barley, and has also taken many awards for exhibits of various grasses, fodder crops, potatoes, etc.

## CATHEDRAL SCENE DURING BRITISH JUBILEE SERVICE TO BE BROADCAST

The colorful procession to historic St. Paul's Cathedral in London, on the occasion of King George's Silver Jubilee celebration, will be described in a special broadcast over WABC and the Columbia network on Monday, May 6, the fifth Jubilee program schedule for the week by CBS.

From 6:00 to 6:30 A. M., A. S. T., on Monday, commentators will describe the arrival of King George and Queen Mary at the Cathedral, where a Thanksgiving Service "for the protection afforded to the King's Majesty during the twenty-five years of his auspicious reign, ordered by the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council", will be held. The procession to and from St. Paul's is one of the major events of the monarch's jubilee celebration.

In addition to this international program, the Columbia's network will carry the following broadcasts from the jubilee:

Sunday, May 5, 2:55 to 3:50 P. M., A. S. T., special religious service by the Archbishop of Canterbury in Concert Hall.

Monday, May 6, 2:40 to 3:05 P. M., A. S. T., Empire Message by King George, broadcast from Buckingham Palace.

Monday, May 6, 4:00 to 4:20 P. M., A. S. T., Rudyard Kipling speaking at a banquet of the Royal Society of St. George.

Thursday, May 9, 6:50 to 7:20 A. M., A. S. T., King George delivering in honour of his accomplishments a doctorate was conferred on him by Queen's University.

The colorful procession to historic St. Paul's Cathedral in London, on the occasion of King George's Silver Jubilee celebration, will be described in a special broadcast over WABC and the Columbia network on Monday, May 6, the fifth Jubilee program schedule for the week by CBS.

The voice of King George V., of Great Britain, who is celebrating his Silver Jubilee, will be heard over the nationwide Columbia Broadcasting System network on Monday, May 6 from 2:45 to 3:00 P. M., A. S. T. The monarch will speak from Buckingham Palace, responding to thousands of congratulatory messages from his subjects.

Another event of the jubilee celebration also will be broadcast by Columbia that day. From 4:00 to 4:20 P. M., A. S. T., the American radio audience will hear Rudyard Kipling, noted British writer, speaking before a banquet of the Royal Society of St. George. The banquet was arranged as a part of the empire-wide celebration of the king's jubilee.

Columbia also has scheduled a broadcast for May 9th, when King George's address before Parliament will be heard in this country. The Jubilee programs have been arranged through the co-operation of the British Broadcasting Corporation.
