

N. B. MOUNTIES PLACE SECOND IN DOMINION SHOOT

Won Chief Constable Competition for Revolver Shooting

Team 2 Won Tyro Title

Cons. F. H. Russell, of Bathurst, Won Special Individual Trophy

According to notification received here today from Ottawa the Royal Canadian Mounted Police No. 1 revolver test of this province has been once again successful in winning the Chief Constable Competition for the championship of New Brunswick, the score being 1396 out of a possible 1500. This team was also awarded second place in the Dominion Championships of the R.C.M.P.

The personnel of the team is as follows: Sergeant J. D. O'Connell, Sergeant B. G. Peters, Corporal R. Pettigrew, Constable W. F. McMullen and Constable F. H. Russell.

It is announced also that No. 2 team obtained the championship of New Brunswick in the Tyro competition, scoring 1307 points out of a possible 1500. Constable F. R. Russell obtained the score of 288 out of a possible 300 and has been awarded a special trophy as individual high scorer throughout the Dominion.

The personnel of No. 2 team is as follows: Sergeant B. C. Jakeman, Sub Constable G. H. Prime, Constable E. Randall, Constable L. V. Brown and Constable E. E. Robinson.

NEWS BRIEFS

POLITICAL BANNERS

A motion was passed at last evening's committee meeting of the city council that both the Conservative and Liberal parties be permitted to place banners across Queen street prior to and in anticipation of the provincial election. The reservation was made, however, that the banners were not to be put up until after the King's Silver Jubilee celebration.

SPOKE ON PATRIOTISM

At the different rooms at the Devon Superior yesterday His Worship Mayor McEvoy presented jubilee medals to the pupils. Mayor McEvoy addressed the assembled pupils and teachers. He spoke of the love, which children as well as grown pupils should have for the King, the Royal Family and for the Empire. It was their duty, Mayor McEvoy said, for them to be patriotic to their King and country and to pray for the welfare of both.

RIVER FELL 9 INCHES

The Saint John river at this point dropped a further nine inches since yesterday, and appears to be well on the way to reaching its normal level without doing any serious damage. Experts of the river believe that the 1935 freshet has not passed the danger peak, unless prolonged rains should occur. Yesterday the D. J. Purdy made its first trip to this city from Saint John, bringing a full cargo. The Purdy left on the return trip today.

CITY COUNCIL WILL CARRY OUT PAVING WORK

May Committee Meeting Passes Paving Program of 2.6 Miles

Pave Needham Street

Provincial and Federal Govts. To Be Sought For Assistance

The city council held its regular May committee meeting in the mayor's office of the city hall last evening, with His Worship Mayor Clark in the chair. The biggest item of business was that concerning the paving program for the summer and in this connection it was decided to carry out the city's paving program of last year by laying approximately two and a quarter miles of pavement in the eastern section of the city, from the end of the pavement near Waterloo Row to the Dominion Experimental Station, and also on the extension of Queen Street to the Victoria Public Hospital, the total cost to be about \$48,000.

Decision was made also to pave Needham street from York to Regent, the estimated cost to be \$3,000. Also two blocks on St. John street lying between Queen and Brunswick streets, and two blocks on King street lying between Regent and Church streets, estimated cost being \$6,000.

Under an agreement with the provincial government made last year half of the cost of paving in the eastern section of the city will be paid by the government.

Sidewalk on York Street?

The city council learned that a petition had been circulated asking for a concrete sidewalk on northerly side of York street, but the matter was temporarily left in abeyance. There was some discussion on the matter of paving, in which it was suggested that the federal government might assist in the city's paving programs. The provincial government already had pledged a fifty-fifty support.

The monthly report on relief was presented by Ald. Warren Maxwell, showing 529 families on relief in April and the total cost \$2,466.47. This figure is a reduction of \$200 over the previous month.

Notification was given that there had been a number of applicants for the position vacated by the death of T. A. Niles, poor commissioner. Ald. Moses Mitchell suggested a message of sympathy to the family of the late Mr. Niles, which will be sent.

Dr. A. P. Potter and Dr. H. B. Loder, Boston, At Former's Camps

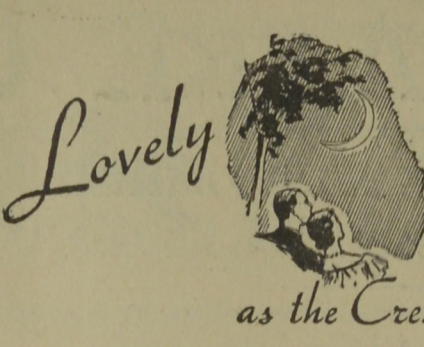
On the eve of the King's Silver Jubilee there has been an influx of sportsmen to the northern fishing waters of the province.

1st Fredericton Girl Guide Company St. Ann's, will have charge of the cloak room at the Jubilee Ball.

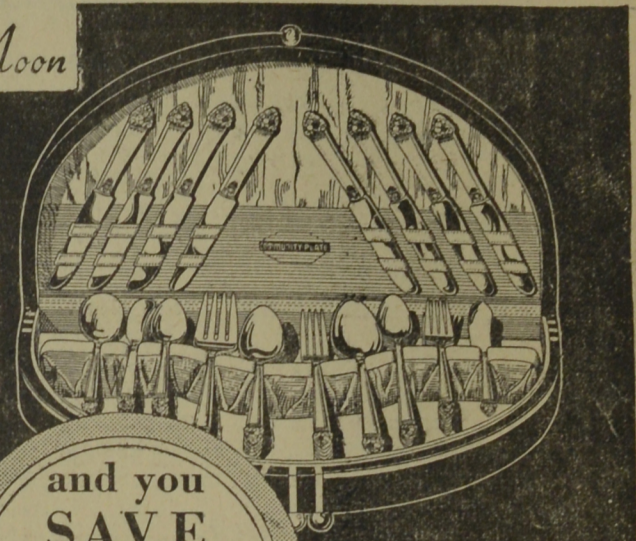
