Grocery Store of R. B. Young Broken Into Thursday Night

### Front Door Forced

Indian Head Cents May Provide Clue to Police Investigators

Some Indian head cents, which Roy B. Young, Aberdeen street grocer, was saving may provide valuable clues to the police, who are investigating a break into that merchant's store which occurred on Thursday night. On that night robbers forced the front door of the store and made away with some cigarettes, candy, and about two dollars—a huge pile of Indian head cents which had been placed in the cash till.

The marauders did their work silently and worked no damage on the store. Evidently they opened the front door of the store by means of a bar of some sort and no glass was broken. The only clue they left was furnished to police by a local barber shop, the proprietor of which is in possession of some of the coppers. The barber remembers of the coppers, all Indian head, being given to him by a couple of rough-appearing men who visited the shop for a haircut later this week.

Mr. Young, the proprietor of the Aberdeen street store, had been saving the cents for a special purpose, which accounted for there being so many in the one place.

The latest break is the second one to occur in this vicinity this week, the first being at the Capital Billiard Parlors in Queen street. The city police are investigating the cases.

## N. B. GUIDES BEFORE BOSTON SPORTING CLUBS

Contingent in Charge of N. B. Exhibit at Show Get Invitations

### Lumberjack Orchestra

Guides To Supply Atlantic Salmon and Sporting Reels

During their stay in Boston as custodians of the New Brunswick exhibit appearing at the New England Sportsmen's and Boat Show this week of February 2nd to 9th, the contingent of guides from this Province will fill a number of independent engagements with prominent fraternal and sporting clubs of the Hub district.

These visits will be supervised by D. W. Griffiths Director of the New Brunswick Government Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel. In addition to his official duties as public relations counsel, Mr. Griffiths is also secretary of the New Brunswick Guides Association and his many contacts in Boston have gained entree for "his boys," as he calls them, to the various clubs where they are to appear. Although the guides are primarily concerned with promoting the interests of their own Province, the type of entertainment they will afford has been designed in a co-operative way, so that both the New Brunswick exhibit and the Sportsmen's Show in general will be benefited.

An innovation this year will be the appearance of a genuine old time backwoods orchestra in Boston with the guides. These artists are Don Messer's New Brunswick Lumberjacks. Their broadcasts over the network of the Canadian Radio Commission through station CHSJ in their native city have been of a quality to earn them the commendation of Hector Charlesworth, Radio Commissioner of Canada. During the week of February 2nd to 9th, New Englanders will have a number of opportunities to hear the Lumberjacks in broadcasts from several stations in Boston. The orchestra will also fill several banquet and luncheon engagements along with the guides during the week.

Monday evening's appearance will be at a dinner to be given at the Hotel Brunswick. The advocate of the New Brunswickers for this occasion was Edward Place, formerly in the sports department of the Boston Transcript and now attached to the New York advertising agency operated by the N. W. Ayer Company. In the spring of 1934 Mr. Place came to New Brunswick to fish for Atlantic salmon. Incidentally a course of this delicacy will feature the dinner on Monday evening. Following the dinner, pictures of wild life and the outdoors taken both in the Province of New Brunswick and in the State of Maine will be shown.

On Tuesday evening the New Brunswick contingent will be guests of the University Club. Again on this occasion courses of Atlantic salmon and the showing of sporting reels will be to the fore.

Thursday evening will see the New Brunswickers divided between two sporting dinners, one sponsored by the Boston City Club and the other by the Winchester Rotary Club.

The Massachusetts Fish and Game Association will have the guides as guest entertainers on Friday evening. The occasion will be a dinner at the Hotel Touraine.

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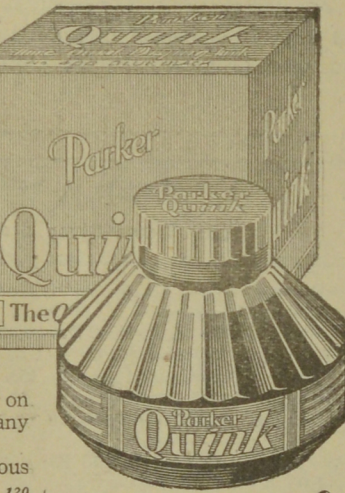
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## "BELIEVE IT OR NOT"

You never can tell. Even the youth who knows it all may live and unlearn. Believe it or not.

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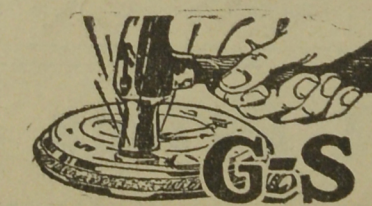
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
