## KING GEORGE SEES TALKIES

## Cinema May Revive Old Custom of Command Shows

LONDON, April 20—The old royal custom of command performances appears to have lapsed as regards plays, but it may be revived for films. The cinema has been one of the few forms of public entertainment at which the King and Queen rarely appear.

But twice recently, in the billiard room of Compton Palace, Eastbourne, where Their Majesties stayed, talkies were shown. The Duke and Duchess of Kent made extensive use of their private cinema during their honeymoon at Himley Hall, but it must be the first time during their reign that the King and Queen have seen films on two successive evenings. The two pictures were full of action and dealt with British themes.

## TOURIST DIRECTOR HERE

D. Leo Dolan, Director of the Federal Tourist Bureau, arrived here from Ottawa yesterday on an extended tour through the Maritime Provinces in connection with the business of his department. Mr. Dolan stated to The Daily Mail today that the Dominion Tourist Bureau expects a 30 per cent. increase in tourist business this year. He will on this trip address motor clubs and associations in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. Mr. Dolan seemed very optimistic about the tourist trade in the Dominion and prophesied that New Brunswick would share in a large way in the predicted increase.

system here, without having the matter first brought before the fire committee. This \$80 was the expense incurred by the official's investigation. Had that company been given a contract to carry out the improvements in the system, the city would not have been charged with that item, it was said.

Referring to the matter of repairs to the fire truck, Alderman Mitchell declared that Alderman Kitchen and Alderman Maxwell on Wednesday had stated that the repairs could have been done locally at a cost of \$2,500.00. He had been at the fire board for 20 years during the last 30 years and never in that time had he had his business ability questioned, he declared. The repairs cost \$5,000.00. Alderman Mitchell said he knew the work could not have been done in Fredericton.

## LARGE EASTER MARKET THIS MORNING

Easter eggs dropped to a new low today in the market at Phoenix Square when vendors were offering them for as low as 20 cents. There was a great demand for eggs, but the supply was equal to the demand, this keeping the price down to 20 cents.

The market stimulated by the bright sunny weather was a large one, many of the vendors having to remain outsidelike for lack of room in the indoor market place.

The current prices were as follows: Eggs, per dozen 20 to 22 cents. Potatoes, per bbl., 75 cents. Butter, per lb., 25 to 28 cents. Maple sugar, per cake, 40 cents. Maple Syrup, per bottle, 25 and 50 cents.

Beef, per lb., 4 to 6 cents. Veal, per lb., 5 to 10 cents. Pork, per lb., 10 to 13 cents. Carrots, per bbl., \$2.50. Chicken, per lb., 30 cents. Turnips, per bbl., 75 cents. Gaspereaux, per lb., 35 cents. Wood, per cord, \$7 to \$8.

## Special Protection for Roads During Early Spring

Effective APRIL 22nd and Until Further Notice, Provincial Highways in York, Sunbury and Queens Counties are Closed To Heavy Motor Vehicle Traffic.

All Passenger Cars, and Commercial Vehicles with a combined weight of load and truck not exceeding 4,000 lbs. are allowed use of the highways until further notice.

Operators of Commercial Vehicles must carry with them a certificate showing combined weight of Chassis and box or body as the case may be.

Highway Engineers have authority and instructions to close any road to all Motor Traffic if they find it being seriously damaged.

These restrictions will be rigidly enforced, penalty for any infraction being a fine of not less than \$8.00 or more than \$20.00. (Highway Act, Section 94).

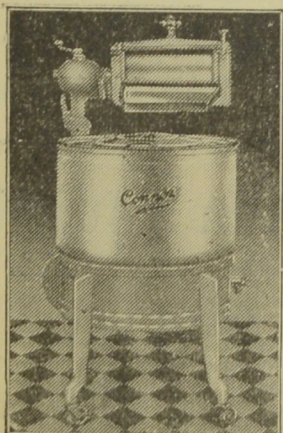
