Worldwide Easter Broadcasts

"National Amateur Night" Broadcast Series Renewed

The weekly "National Amateur Night" broadcasts, first nationwide radio program devoted to the presentation of amateur talent, will continue to be heard over the WABC-Columbia network each Sunday from 7.00 to 7.30 P.M., A.S.T., under a newly-signed contract. The extended series starts Sunday, April 21.

Ray Perkins, comedian, and Arnold Johnson, conductor, will continue to be heard in their respective roles. As in the past, a group of about eight amateurs will be presented each week. A jury of five judges will select a winner in each program, to be awarded a gold medal, while the winner of the audience vote will appear three weeks later as professionally-paid guest artist.

Many winners of amateur contests being conducted in Fox theatres will be presented within the next few months. Such contests are now being held in the Middle and Far West, and the winners will have their expenses paid to New York by the sponsors of the broadcast series for the purposes of competing in the Sunday evening programs.

Pope Pius XI. Will Be Heard From Vatican City—Broadcast From Jerusalem — Famous Cantata by Stainer To Be Heard From Cleveland—Annual Sunrise Service From Hollywood Bowl at 9.00 a.m.; A Full Day of Appropriate Easter Services and Music.

An Eastertide message by Pope Pius XI. brought to Canadian listeners from Vatican City; a special broadcast from Jerusalem, birthplace of Christianity; peace pleas by five Cardinals of the Roman Catholic church, and microphone descriptions of various other Easter services have been arranged by the Columbia Broadcasting System for Easter weekend.

Pope Pius will be heard throughout Europe and America when he speaks from the Vatican City station, between 7.30 and 8.00 A.M., A.S.T., on April 21.

The broadcast from Jerusalem will reach American listeners on Easter Sunday, from 12.15 to 12.30 P.M., A.S.T., and will include the tolling of bells in Christ Church as well as

descriptions of Easter Day scenes in the ancient city.

Stainer's Cantata

The five Catholic Cardinals will be heard also on Saturday, April 20, each pleading for international amity. Their broadcast is from 1.45 to 2.55 P.M., A.S.T., from Europe and American points.

The Eastertide broadcasts will include the Choir of the Church of Our Saviour, Cleveland, singing Sir John Stainer's cantata, "St. Mary Magdalen." The choral group of 50 voices, supported by the Cleveland Heights orchestra under the direction of George F. Strickling, will be heard from 12.30 A.M. to 1.00 A.M. A.S.T., on Saturday.

After Pope Pius has broadcast at 7.30 A.M., A.S.T., on Easter morning, at 8.00 A.M. Easter music will be heard from several great choral groups at Soldier's Field in Chicago. "Alleluiah, Christ Is Risen" and "Oh, Praise the Name of the Lord" will be presented by the Wheaton College Men's Glee Club. The Chicago Easter Sunrise Chorus of 3,000 voices will next be heard singing "Hallelujah for the Cross." The United Glee Clubs, with 1,500 voices, will be heard in "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," following a brief scriptural reading by Theodore W. Anderson, President of the Swedish Covenant Churches of America. The

FIRST BROADCAST OF PAPAL MASS

POPE PIUS XI. will be heard both during celebration of pontifical High Mass in St. Peter's Church, Vatican City, and in his Easter benediction to the multitude in an international broadcast to Canada and the United States, which will be carried by both the Columbia Broadcasting System and the National Broadcasting Company. It will be the first time that a papal mass has ever been broadcast to this continent.

The Vatican City program will start at approximately 6.45 a.m., A.S.T., when silver trumpets in historic St. Peter's are heard in the "Benedictus." The radio audience then will hear the Holy Father singing the "Pater Noster," followed by a chorus of the "Agnus Dei."

The Pontiff's exit into the square will be accompanied by trumpets and by the acclamation of the crowds. The papal benediction will be heard here at about 8.00 a.m., A.S.T. Announcements will be given in six languages.

On the dial this program will be heard at 66K., 860K., and 790K.

service will close with the singing of the Rev. Joseph Gray, chancellor of the American University of Washington, D.C., and the benediction will be pronounced by the Rev. Captain Sydney Key Evans, chief of chaplains of the United States Navy.

Sunrise Service

Beginning at 8.30 A.M., the half-hour Sunrise Memorial Service, an annual event held this year under the auspices of the Grand Commandery Knights Templar of the District of Columbia, will be broadcast from Arlington National Cemetery. The service will open with prayer by the Rev. James Shera Montgomery, chaplain of the House of Representatives. A short sermon will be delivered by

the Rev. Joseph Gray, chancellor of the American University of Washington, D.C., and the benediction will be pronounced by the Rev. Captain Sydney Key Evans, chief of chaplains of the United States Navy. Music will be by the United States Marine Band, under the direction of Captain Taylor Branson, and hymns by the Choral Group of the Eastern Star, under the direction of Theodore C. Lewis.

Hollywood Bowl

At 9.00 A.M., the CBS audience will be taken to California for the annual sunrise service in Hollywood

Bowl. Highlights of this event this year will be the Sunrise Trumpet Call "Gloria Patri" by five men and five women trumpeters; a reading entitled "Salutation to the Dawn," by Mary Pickford; a solo, "Open the Gates of the Temple," by Richard Dennis, 22 year old tenor, and an Easter message delivered by Dr. J. George Dorn of the Hollywood Lutheran Church. Morris Koehler's Orchestra will play the Third Movement from Beethoven's Fifth Symphony and will accompany the Hollywood Festival Choir, under the direction of Charles L. Munro, in "Unfold Ye Portals" from "The Redemption" by Gounod. Closing features of the service will be the singing of "Christ the Lord is Risen Today" by the Easter Sunrise Chorus, under the direction of Hugo Kirchofer, and the benediction by Dr. E. H. Longbrake of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Easter Messages

The two "Church of the Air" speakers for Easter Sunday will bring special Easter messages to their listeners. They are the Rev. Arnold H. Lowe, D.D., speaking at 11.00 A.M. A.S.T., from the Kingshighway Presbyterian Church in St. Louis, Mo., and Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner, speaking at 2.00 P.M., A.S.T., from the Euclid Avenue Temple in Cleveland, Ohio.

At 6.00 P.M., A.S.T., from the "Little Country Church of Hollywood." Columbia will bring another Easter Program. The broadcast will begin with Parson Josiah and his wife Sarah, rattling along a country road toward the church. In addition to Parson Josiah's Easter talk there will be short talks by others of the congregation, a piano solo by Rudy Simmons, the storekeeper, and hymns by the Goose Creek Male Quartet.
