

WEIGHT LIMIT SET FOR ROADS IN 3 COUNTIES

Temporary Wgt. Limit Deemed Necessary by Dept. Minister.

4,000-Pound Limit

In Effect From Monday Until Better Frost Conditions Prevail

Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, has announced that a 4,000-pound limit will be set on motor vehicles travelling on the provincial highways until better frost conditions prevail. The restriction goes into effect Easter Monday and applies to the counties of York, Sunbury and Queens, but highway engineers have full authority to close any road that they think is being seriously damaged by heavy traffic.

Pending the improvement of frost conditions, Hon. D. A. Stewart, Minister of Public Works, has placed a weight limit on commercial motor vehicles using the highways of York, Sunbury and Queens. The restriction is effective April 22.

Notices:

Notices being posted today restrict commercial vehicles to a combined weight of load and truck not exceeding 4,000 pounds. No restriction is set upon passenger cars.

Operators of commercial vehicles will be required to carry with them a certificate showing combined weight of chassis and box or body as the case may be.

At the present time it has been found necessary to impose these restrictions only in the counties of York, Sunbury and Queens; but according to the current notice, "Highway Engineers have authority and instructions to close any road to all motor traffic if they find it being seriously damaged."

TORRID SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL IN SPECIAL MEET

Ald. Moses Mitchell Threatened to Resign From Fire Committ.

Heated Discussions

Fire Chief is Censured; Alarm Contract To Harry C. Moore

Alderman Moses Mitchell caused an unexpected flurry in the City Council at the special meeting on Thursday afternoon, when he threatened that he would resign his seat on the fire committee if certain statements made by other aldermen were not retracted. He contended that the other aldermen in their statements had challenged his business ability and integrity.

He stated that if the statements were proved correct he was ready to resign from the committee, but if they were not proved correct he demanded the aldermen to retract them. The remarks concerned the cost of repairing the fire department's motor pumper last year.

Alderman Warren J. Maxwell and Alderman G. Willard Kitchen to whom Alderman Mitchell referred particularly stated that they were willing to retract everything at which Alderman Mitchell took offence, but at the same time pointed out that the remarks were not meant for any particular member of the fire committee.

Taken Too Literally

Alderman David McCaughey, walking out from the meeting, and Alderman C. Hedley Forbes said they believed the whole discussion out of order. The latter thought it was a strange state of affairs if every remark made in council meetings was to be taken literally. Later he reminded Alderman Mitchell of the latter's recent charge that politics had prompted the finance committee to recommend a partial restoration of the salary cuts of civic employees and of the absolute lack of foundation for such a charge.

The fire committee chairman reiterated that a challenge had been made to his integrity and ability but that he was willing to accept the retractions. He thought the aldermen should be careful in the future of the remarks they made.

Mayor W. G. Clark expressed the view that Alderman Maxwell had "stated the matter very nicely" and he thought all could agree that the remarks referred to were made carelessly without intent to question Alderman Mitchell's integrity and ability.

Thursday's and Wednesday's special meetings were held to consider and take action on means of effecting improvements in the city's fire alarm system. A contract for the work was awarded Thursday to Harry C. Moore, local electrical engineer, for \$610.00 and the council decided to purchase the necessary batteries at a cost of \$323.00.

In addition, the council adopted a resolution requiring any investigations to be carried on in the future to be brought before the proper council committee before any expenditures were authorized. This was to prevent a recurrence of an incident which it was pointed out would cost the city \$80 and which one alderman submitted should not be charged to the council.

Censure Fire Chief

In effect, the motion censured the fire chief, Karl A. Walker, for bringing an official of the Northern Electric Co., Ltd., from Campbellton to Fredericton to inspect the fire alarm

The service opened with the hymn "O Come and Mourn With Me Awhile," followed by a scripture reading, "To the Church," by Rev. G. W. Guion.

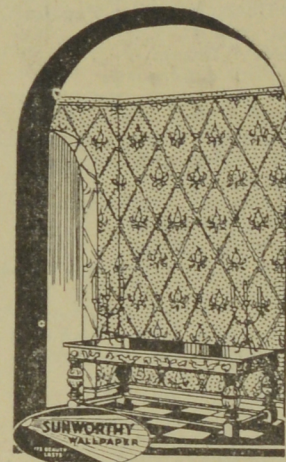

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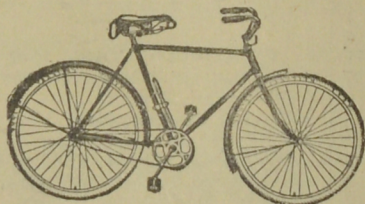
