

The four hundred members of the Fredericton Community Concert Association are to hear four concerts during the 1935-1936 season according to an announcement made today by Mrs. A. P. Crockett, President of the local organization. The concerts are as follows: Nov. 15th, Myrtle Leonard, Metropolitan Opera contralto; Dec. 9th, Kneisel-Alden-Turner trio, piano, violin and violoncello; Feb. 3rd, Malcolm and Godden, eminent Canadian due, pianists; and on May 4th, the Russian Imperials are scheduled to appear here.

The scene of the recitals is expected to be the Normal School Auditorium, which was used during previous seasons.

Myrtle Leonard, contralto, is now ranked among the foremost concert artists of the day. She has sung with the San Francisco and Metropolitan Opera Companies with distinguished success and her recent Town Hall, New York, debut recital brought forth great praise from the critics. The local executive consider themselves fortunate in engaging this young artist for the opening concert. This will be Miss Leonard's only appearance in the Maritimes.

The Kneisel-Alden-Turner Trio is an ensemble made up of extraordinarily talented young artists. This group, which will concertize extensively in both Canada and the United States during the coming season, has been heralded as a premier musical organization. Their appearance here is being anticipated with interest.

Malcolm and Godden are two young Canadian artists who have achieved their international reputation as duopianists by sheer genius. They have both astounding pianoforte techniques and great interpretative abilities. They are now considered by several eminent critics to be the greatest piano duo team now living on this continent.

The Russian Imperial Singers bring the season to a close with a recital on May 4th. Included in this group are two tenors, a baritone, a basso and a basso profundo. "Strength, temperament, imagination, inventiveness, individuality, grotesquerie—such are the main features of the offerings of the Russian Imperial Singers."

Among the attractions of note at nearby Community Concert centres are the recitals of the Hall Johnson Negro Choir; Jose Iturbi, pianist; and the joint recital of Helen Jepson, soprano, and Richard Bonelli, baritone, all at Saint John, and the recital of the baritone, Wilbur Evans in Moncton, Nov. 4th. Mr. Evans achieved great artistic and personal success in his recital here two years ago. Following his present Maritime tour he is reported to go to Hollywood where he will make several feature films.
