PROPOSED NEW BUS SERVICE IS DISCUSSED

Marysville Town Council to Meet With Devon Re Matter

No Action Here

Viewpoints of Respective Councils To Be Sought

The proposed new bus service, which would operate between this city, Devon and Marysville was discussed by the town council of Marysville at a special meeting last evening, although nothing definite concerning the granting of operating privileges in that town to the proposed bus service was reached.

It was decided that delegates from the council would interview the Devon town council, possibly tonight, in order to get their viewpoint on the matter.

WILL PURCHASE BUSES

One or two companies in the city are ready to purchase busses as soon as a franchise can be obtained from the Motor Carrier Board. At the meeting of the Marysville council last evening P. J. Hughes, K. C., appeared on behalf of Vaughan and Goodspeed of this city, and Mr. Limerick represented Sullivan Brothers.

The bus service if it materializes will cost something like \$20,000 or \$25,000. It is understood that some of the taxi drivers favor the plan, as a number of them would be employed.

TEMPERATURE DROPS TWENTY SIX DEGREES

Extreme Heat is Succeeded by a 62 Degree Temperature

Relief For Citizens

Several Hours' Rainfall Occurred Here Early This Morning

The temperature in central New Brunswick which maintained a level of 100 degrees and more for three days this week, dropping to 90 degrees yesterday, tumbled to a point 64 degrees Fahrenheit today. The drop made the temperature seem real chilly today in view of the intense heat of the previous few days.

Rain fell for several hours early this morning and heavy winds occurred last night. Citizens were greatly relieved by the fall in temperature, and the brief rainfall lent promise of revived conditions in the crops in this section of the province.

CABINET MEETS TONIGHT

Although it was expected that the provincial cabinet would meet here yesterday, Premier A. A. Dymally has not yet arrived here. He is expected some time this afternoon or early evening and the cabinet will likely convene this evening. Most of the members of the cabinet are in the city today.

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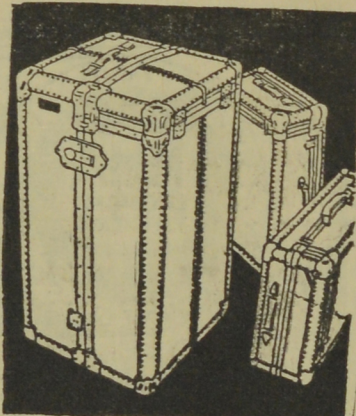
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
