

### CANADIAN GEN. ELECTRIC HEADS VISIT U. N. B.

Interview Senior Electrical Students As To Employment

#### Taken As Good Sign

Had Not Been Here For Two Years Owing To Econ. Conditions

After an absence of two years, representatives of the Canadian General Electric Company are back in the city interviewing senior electrical students at the University of New Brunswick with the idea of offering employment after graduation.

W. M. Cruthers, who is in charge of the employment department at Peterborough, Ontario, and H. W. Wright, manager of the Canadian General Electric Company branch at Halifax, are the two who interviewed this year's class of graduating electrical students.

#### A Good Sign

The visit here this year of these representatives is regarded as a good sign and means that economic conditions must be improved with the above named company.

It was the custom for representatives of the company to visit here each year and offer employment at least a few of the graduating seniors. Two years ago, because of the bleak outlook, these visits were stopped.

Discussing the visit here yesterday with Prof. A. F. Baird of the U. N. B. faculty, W. M. Cruthers stated that the Canadian General Electric Company intends to employ in future, only these youths who have had college training for their factories.

The last to receive employment with the company from this university was J. Herbert Smith, son of Charles Smith, Brunswick Street. Mr. Smith is now at the Toronto headquarters, being assistant to the dominion manager of the Wire and Cable Department.

### KING'S BENCH MET, ADJOURNED THIS MORNING

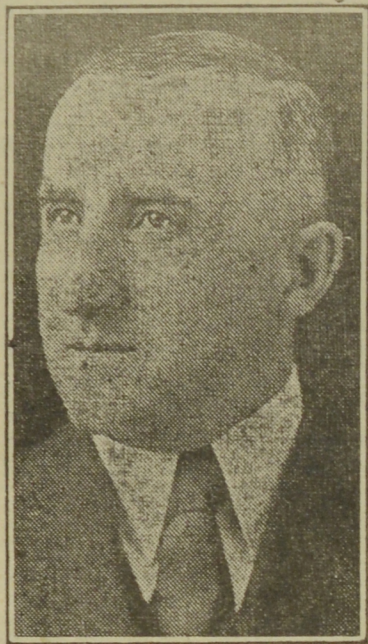
Mr. Justice LeBlanc Adjourns Court, Finding No Cases on Slate

#### Jurymen Depart

Auto Collision Case Is Settled Out of Court This Morning

The January nisi prius sittings of the court of King's Bench for York began and ended abruptly this morning. Mr. Justice A. T. LeBlanc, the presiding judge, found no cases when court opened this morning and immediately dismissed the petit jury and adjourned the court sine die.

The only civil case scheduled, that

of Harold Porter of this city, vs. Valley Motor Company, Limited, resulting from an automobile collision, had been settled just previous to court opening today.

The jurymen who met here today were given one day's pay. This afternoon they dispersed to their respective homes. In adjourning court Mr. Justice LeBlanc mentioned the heavy docket of the York County court last week, this being the cause of the lack of cases on the King's Bench division. The next session will not be until June.

### A. J. McEVOY LIKELY TO BE DEVON MAYOR

Today Nomination Day In Devon, Changes in Town Council

#### Coombes Retiring

Roy Flowers and Gerald Ashfield New Candidates in Field

A. J. McEvoy, who has been identified with Devon civic politics for the past eighteen years, will probably succeed A. W. Coombes as mayor of Devon for the ensuing year of 1935. Nominations close this evening at six o'clock and so far no candidates have appeared to contest Ald. McEvoy. Mayor Coombes has announced that he will offer again.

Ald. McEvoy who has consented to run this year was a member of the first Devon Council, the one which 'fathered' the incorporation of Devon as a township in 1917, and has contributed very valuable service at the council board. Furthermore, he is considered one of the finest auditors in the Dominion of Canada. Mayor Coombes has served faithfully in the capacity of mayor for seven years.

Two others who are likely to be members of this year's council are Roy Flowers, who has filed his papers and is expected to succeed A. J. McEvoy as alderman; and also Gerald Ashfield, who will run as alderman in place of William Jaffrey, the
