Devon Town Council Discusses Relief

The Devon town council at its regular August meeting last night held a discussion on relief matters, and considered whether or not to dispense with direct relief, following Fredericton's example. While the matter was discussed at some length nothing definite was done. It was felt that a certain extent of relief will have to be carried on.

Mayor A. J. McEvoy presided at the meeting, and all aldermen were present except Ald. Young. Bills for the month were ordered paid and supplementary estimates for the roads passed. William Kesson and W. H. Elliott were appointed auditors for the school accounts. The town marshal was authorized to take immediate action against all persons whose dog taxes were not paid. A grant of \$40 was ordered to be paid to the Devon baseball club for expenses. Tax appeals also were dealt with. It was decided that Devon will not join the Union of N. B. Municipalities this year, since the town had not belonged last year either.

Ex-Queen of Greece To Produce Powder

VIENNA, August 13—Former Queen Elizabeth of Greece, divorced wife of King George, doing her share to reduce the ranks of unemployed royalty, last night revealed plans to conduct her own cosmetics business.

Daughter of the dowager Queen Marie of Rumania and sister of King Carol, she already has purchased an estate near Baniak, Rumania from Count Karacsony. The ex-queen is busy supervising the installation of her face-powder factory.

She will grow the rice for the powder on her own ground, where irrigation canals are being dug under her personal supervision. Elizabeth is said to have studied the production of face powder thoroughly.

Ants Becoming a Pest In and Around F'ton

ants, and left undisturbed until the insects have disappeared. It can be placed around the nests or in houses, but care should be taken to prevent children or pets gaining access to it as it is poisonous. The ants in crawling over the dust get it on their legs and in removing it with their mandibles swallow sufficient to be killed. They will, therefore, not die on immediate contact. If the dust is placed outside, warm dry weather is most favourable as a rain will spoil its effectiveness.

"Another method is to fumigate the nests if they can be found. This can best be done by making small holes in the nests pouring a tablespoonful of Carbon bisulphide into each and covering up the holes immediately with damp earth or sacking. Calcium cyanide dust may be used in the same way but this also is extremely poisonous and should be handled with care. Carbon bisulphide is inflammable and explosive when mixed with air and should, therefore, be kept away from fire.

With moderate infestations, baits may be used although they are somewhat more trouble. Full particulars will be furnished on application to the Dominion Entomological Laboratory, Fredericton, N. B."
