

14TH ANNUAL POULTRY FIELD DAY THURSDAY

Prizes for "Free-for-all"
Poultry Judging
Competition

Annual Meetings of Pro-
ducers, Breeders and

The Dominion Experimental Station here will feature its 14th annual poultry field day on Thursday, commencing at nine o'clock. One of the outstanding items on the day's program will be the "free-for-all" poultry judging competition which lasts from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. The Experimental Station will donate five pedigreed cockerels as prizes to the winner of this contest.

Annual meetings of the R. O. P. Society, the New Brunswick Poultry Producers Association, the N. B. Registered Poultry Breeders' Association will be conducted during the day.

There will be an inspection of the poultry plant, live stock and pastures during the morning and at noon a basket lunch is to be served. C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Station, will act as chairman at the general meeting to be held after luncheon.

Several Addresses

Addresses are to be given by Hon. A. C. Taylor, Minister of Agriculture and others. A. R. Jones, manager of the Maritime Co-operative Egg and Poultry Exchange, will deliver an address on "The Export Opportunity for Eggs and Poultry to Great Britain." F. Leslie Wood, poultry superintendent here, will speak on "Highlights of the Poultry Science Convention," and Prof. J. P. Landry, provincial poultry husbandman of the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture will deliver an address on "Practical Poultry Management." Another feature will be a demonstration re plucking poultry with the aid of paraffin wax. This will be directed by Dr. N. H. Grace of the National Research Council at Ottawa.

During the day the silver trophy donated by W. H. Thorne & Company of Saint John to Lloyd McKinney of Gagetown, winner of the 1933-34 New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, will be made, and winners in the judging contest are to be announced.

ANTS BECOMING A PEST IN AND AROUND F'TON

Ant Hills in Sandy
Places Increasing —
Housewives Annoyed

Ants Entering Houses

Director Balch Gives Ad-
vice Following The Daily
Mail's Article

R. E. Batch, entomologist in charge of the Dominion Entomological Laboratory in this city has taken up the matter of the ants mentioned last evening on our front page editorial in The Daily Mail.

Mr. Batch who is a very efficient officer, states to The Daily Mail that while it is not the duty of the entomological department to go out and fight these or other pests, that they shall be glad at all times to receive reports of any insect trouble and to recommend to the public what-ever system of control may seem possible.

During the past few months the ants as stated in The Daily Mail yesterday are getting to be a pest to householders in different sections of the city, especially in places where the soil is inclined to be of a sandy formation and is exposed to the noon-day sun. Speaking of these ants, Mr. Balch says:—

"Ants are one of the most widespread types of insect pests and are often exasperating to the householder on account of their habit of going into houses when they find suitable food there. There are many different species and luckily, those which we have in Canada are not as troublesome as those which occur farther south. They sometimes become a nuisance in gardens, especially in warm places exposed to the sun where the soil is sandy. They do not, however, feed on plant tissue and when crawling over plants in the garden are generally in search of aphids or plant secretions. They also feed on other insects and seeds, and are very fond of many things found in the pantry, particularly sweet or greasy substances. The largest ant found in this region is the Carpenter ant which feeds on decayed wood and often makes its nest in the stems of trees. One of the smallest and most troublesome is Pharaoh's ant which had its origin in the tropics and confines itself to heated buildings where it invades kitchens and pantries. Another common species is the small yellowish-brown lawn ant which makes its nest in lawns and gardens.

CONTROL

Probably the most generally satisfactory material for killing ants is Sodium fluoride, or, better still, Sodium fluosilicate. These substances may be obtained from the druggist in a fine powder and should be scattered lightly in places frequented by the ants. (Continued on Page Five)

RECONSTRUCTION COMMITTEE HEADS HERE THIS WEEK

Organize Returned Men

Convention Slated for
Capital Within Ten
Days is Report

One of the veterans committee of the Reconstruction party passed through Fredericton by car today and stopped at The Daily Mail office for a few minutes. He states that the veterans' committee is organizing returned men throughout the dominion in support of Hon. H. H. Stevens' platform. Speaking to The Daily Mail, he said: "As you know Mr. Stevens made definite promises in the interests of returned men and it is our intention next week, after our organization in the capital is completed, to have a veterans' committee of our local Stevens' club formed. I am asking you to say this because I have had letters from several veterans in Fredericton asking us what we were going to do in their behalf. Mr. Stevens in his platform made some very definite promises in regard to what he was going to do for the veterans and all these promises will be carried out, when he gets into power. In the meantime, probably some time next week, Mr. Stevens' whole platform, including the portion relating to the war veterans will be brought before the public".

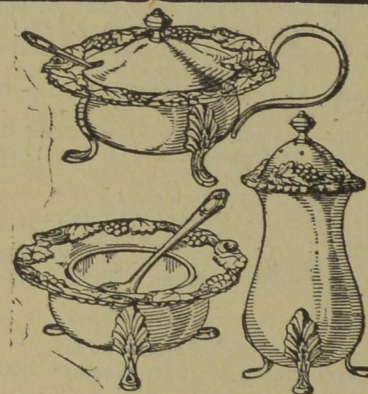
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
