INVADE ERITREA

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 9.—An Ethiopian leader has invaded Eritrea, the Government announces officially. Many desertions of Italian natives to Ethiopians are claimed. Ras Kassa is reported moving near Adowa with 60,000 men.

LATE FLASHES

MADRID, Oct. 9.—The Spanish Cabinet today approved a defence budget of 50,000,000 pesetas—about \$7,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Secretary of State Hull today called for the wholehearted support of the American people for President Roosevelt's neutrality proclamation.

HAVANA, Oct. 9.—The Cuban Navy Department announced today it had seized the British motoryacht Annie Lola near North Coast Island, 10 miles east of Havana, on a charge of failing to stop when ordered.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The State Department today announced the exchange of ratifications yesterday at Berlin of the agreement between the United States and Germany withdrawing "most favorable nation" treatment of commerce between the two countries.
