HUB HAS NO TEAM TO JOIN MARITIME LEAGUE THIS YEAR

Stadium Taken Over by Henry White; Central Loop Proposed

MONCTON, Oct. 9.—Announcement was made here today that Henry White had taken over the Stadium for the coming winter. Preparations for ice-making will likely be commenced about October 21.

Last week Ambrose Wheeler, successful bidder for the building when tenders were asked for by the city, announced he would be unable to operate the Stadium due to the fact that he could not gather a hockey team to enter in a Maritime Hockey League. At that time the city council named a committee to deal with the matter, and today it was announced that they had accepted the offer of Mr. White for the use of the building for the winter months.

Just what is in store for hockey for Moncton is unknown, but it was learned that Moncton will not be in a Maritime cycle, if one operates this winter, but that more attention will be paid to junior and intermediate hockey and possibly a "home brew" senior team.

U.N.B. and Trojans Play Saturday

Canucks Form a New Hockey Club

QUEBEC, Oct. 9.—Formation of the Club de Hockey Canadien, Inc., which will operate the Montreal Canadiens in the National League, was announced in the Government Gazette today.

The new club, with a total capital stock of \$225,000, was formed following the sale of the franchise by Joe Cattarinich to Ernest Savard, Montreal broker, and others.

In the announcement sponsors of the new company are Savard, Louisa Laramée, stenographer; Giles Dansereau and Lucien Dansereau, accountants of Montreal; and Joseph Alexandre Prud'homme, advocate of Westmount, Que. The company will be managed by the five directors.

CRUTCH ON ROAD TO RECOVERY

SHAWINIGAN FALLS, Que., Oct. 7.—A good day was passed today by Nels Crutchfield, Montreal Canadiens hockey player who suffered a fractured skull in an automobile accident here Sept. 28.

His temperature, pulse and blood pressure were normal and the centre and defenceman of the National Hockey League team recognized his father. His chances for recovery were considered very good by Dr. D. L. Mac-

Frank H. Lordly, secretary-manager of the Nova Scotia Exhibition Commission, which owns the Forum, said the teams would play for a silver trophy put up by the Commission.

COTTON AND STEWART TO AMERICANS

MONTREAL, Oct. 8.—National Hockey League heads, in session here on Saturday, ruled that owners of the St. Louis club will have to operate their franchise or surrender the same. They will not be permitted to loan or sell their players and keep the team inactive next season.

Redmond Quain, spokesman for the Ottawa, St. Louis moguls, stated that the latter had been offered \$30,000 for the franchise and twenty-five players, but there would be no sale unless someone mentions the sum of \$100,000. (And it isn't likely that anybody will be so reckless.)

Although no deals were made, it was learned on the best of authority that Nelson Stewart, centre player of the Boston Bruins, and Harold Cotton of the Maple Leafs will do their puck-chasing for the New York Americans.

Last season Stewart very playfully brought his stick down on the noble "dome" of "Deed" Klein, and the manager of the pained Amerks suggested that he be barred for life. He wasn't, however, and now the Dwyermen are delighted to secure his services. They probably would rather have "Big Sam" with 'em than against 'em. It's safer. Stewart isn't the world's greatest backchecker, but with Cotton supporting him he will navigate all right, and as usual break up a lot of battles by outstanding dexterity when in the scoring zone.

Donald, in charge of the case. L. Swift, driver of the car in which Crutchfield was riding when it collided with another automobile, today was reported improved. He suffered a brain concussion.

ART ROSS LEADS CANADIAN AMER. LEAGUE

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Arthur H. Ross, of the Bruins National Hockey League Club, was unanimously chosen president of the Canadian American League at a meeting here Saturday, marked chiefly by debate on routine procedure for the coming season.

Ross was selected to head the minor hockey circuit after Judge Dooley, of Providence, tendered his resignation owing to pressure of personal business. Maurice Podoloff, of New Haven, was appointed secretary-treasurer, a position Dooley had also held.

The hockey men approved entrance of the Springfield club to the Canam loop and also put the official seal on the acquisition by New York Rangers of the Philadelphia franchise. The Springfield club was formerly operated in Quebec, but the long northern trips by the southern clubs proved detrimental to continued operation of the Quebec team in the Canadian city.

The Philadelphia outfit will henceforth be known as the "Rambler." Hitherto they had played as the "Arrows." Herbert Gardiner, coach for several years, will again act in that capacity for the Philadelphians.

Discussion on a proposal to play an interlocking schedule of games with the International League was deferred until a meeting to be called by President Ross in the near future. At this meeting rule changes, naming of referees and outlining of a playing schedule will also be taken up.

Intercollegiate Tennis Underway Here Today

The New Brunswick Intercollegiate Tennis Tournament got underway at the Riverside Courts today when the U. N. B. team crossed reacquits with a team from Mt. Allison. Although this year's U.N.B. team does not look as good as last year's they are confident that with N.
