

SMOKER BY LIBERALS A SPLENDID ONE

More Than 500 Attended Entertainment Last Evening

Broadcast Heard

Candidate Mayor W. G. Clark and Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C. Spoke

The Liberal smoker at the Liberal Committee rooms last evening proved to be a pronounced success, with a number of fine addresses given, and also an enjoyable entertainment program. Frank Shute acted as chairman and the speakers included E. Allison MacKay, George Burden, who was a Liberal M.P.P. thirty years ago; Arthur Limerick, Frank B. Osborne, Alfred Verxa, Clarence N. Goodspeed, P. Worship Mayor Clark, the candidate, and Hon. J. B. McNair, K. C., attorney-general, also spoke, arriving later in the evening from Marysville where both spoke at a rally in the Lyric Theatre there. About 500 attended the smoker, which was undoubtedly one of the finest ever held by the Liberal party in this city during the campaign.

The entertainment program consisted of selections from the Marysville quartet, and also selections from Murray Short and his banjo players. Following the speaking and entertainment cigars and cigarettes were served and those present listened to the big broadcast of the eight Liberal premiers and Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King which was sent over a national hookup and which was heard in the Liberal committee rooms via CFNB.

Among the many pleasant things about last evening's entertainment at the smoker was the singing of a song by R. A. Woods of Rusagonis, the song being one of Mr. Wood's own composition. Altogether the evening was spent both profitably and enjoyably.

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ADDITION TO HIGH SCHOOL SAID LIKELY

Erection of an Auxiliary Building May Cost \$20,000

Pressed For Space

Present Building Erected Ten Years Ago, Taxed to Overflowing.

"The time has almost arrived when the city of Fredericton will have to provide the demands of the Fredericton School Board for a \$20,000 addition to the Fredericton High School building". Such was the statement made today to The Daily Mail by a prominent member of the Fredericton school board.

When the present high school building was completed about ten years ago there were many who contended at that time that the building was entirely too large to meet the needs of our present population and that it would be many years before increased space was required at the Fredericton high school. Today with six hundred pupils the building is taxed to its utmost capacity. In fact the high school teachers claim that they are very much handicapped for lack of room in which to carry out the different departments of work.

Increased Facilities

The matter of increased school facilities especially in so far as they relate to the Fredericton high school has been discussed informally by the Fredericton school board at its different closed-door meetings and the general opinion is understood to have been arrived at that an addition to the present building will be required for the opening of the next school year in September, 1936. TELLS STORY OF CANADA'S EAST ARCTIC

George Horner, Junior at U. N. B. Tells of Summer Trip

Was Wireless Operator

Habits of Eskimos and Treatment by Hudson Bay Company

Tales of the Arctic regions of Canada, the habits of Eskimos, and the treatment of these latter by the Canadians in the northern regions featured an entertaining address by George Horner of London, England, who spoke before the Delta Rho Society at the Memorial Buildings at the University of New Brunswick last evening. The Co-ed Society moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Horner, himself a junior at U. N. B. but who has been for the past two summers a wireless operator on the Royal Mail steamer, "Nascope" in the Eastern Arctic.

The title of Mr. Horner's address was "Canada's Eastern Arctic". Lantern slides illustrated his remarks. The wearing apparel of the Eskimos and their habits were quite minutely portrayed through the slides. Mr. Horner described some of his adventures during the past summer. He explained how the Eskimos made clothes from skins and described also the general wants of the Eskimo family. He told of the habits and work of the Eskimo women.

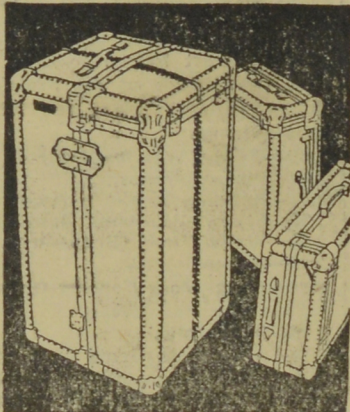
White Justice
