Prime Minister-elect Mackenzie King yesterday took time out from his cabinet-making task to attend the wedding of the daughter of one of his political adversaries and to propose the brides health. The Liberal leader went yesterday afternoon to the wedding of Miss Cynthia Jean Hill, daughter of Hammet P. Hill, Conservative runner-up in West Ottawa in the general election, and George Manson Campbell of Ottawa.

Major Good had on exhibition several types of old clocks, notably the banjo clock and the Ely clock, each of which has an intrinsic value of \$100. There are three known banjo clocks in the city, one is in the possession of Mrs. Carleton Allen, another is owned by Luke S. Morrison, and the third is owned by Major Good himself and is part of his valuable collection of antiques. A hearty vote of thanks was extended to the speaker for his splendid address.

ERNST DISCLOSES RECENT WEDDING

Married Former Ottawa Editor's Daughter a Month Ago

Hon. W. G. Ernst, Minister of Fisheries, who went down to defeat in Monday's general election, disclosed yesterday that he was married nearly a month ago to Miss Anne Quayle.

Enroute to Ottawa to attend the final meeting of the defeated Government, Mr. Ernst said that the ceremony had been held quietly in Moncton on September 25, in the manse of St. John's United church. Rev. Dr. J. A. Ramsay officiating. The bride is a daughter of Thomas W. Quayle, former editor of the Ottawa Citizen.

Mr. Ernst, appointed to the portfolio after dissolution to become the youngest member of the Cabinet, passed through Moncton from his home in Nova Scotia constituency of Queens-Lunenburg which he has represented since first elected to the House of Commons in 1928.

The marriage to Miss Quayle was the second for the 38 year old lawyer, who was first married in 1923 to Miss Dorothea Peppelstone of Halifax. There were four children born of the first marriage.

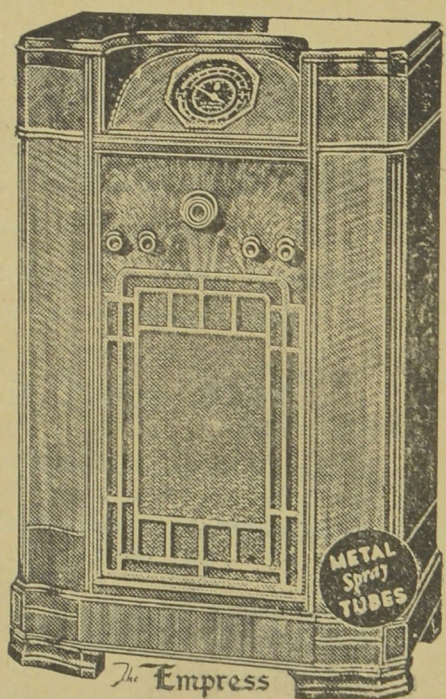
