Thornton Fisher, noted sports commentator, will come to Sheldrake that day and interview Braddock for listeners to the Briggs Sports Review of the Air. The broadcast will take place just five days before the scheduled Baer-Braddock championship fight at Madison Square Stadium, on June 13.

Although broadcasting has been a regular part of Baer's routine during his current training, radio listeners have heard Braddock only once or twice before. The challenger will make no effort to compete with his opponent as an actor, but will limit his interview with Fisher to a discussion of the forthcoming test of fistic supremacy.

Braddock is one of many noted sports figures who are being presenter to the radio audience by Fisher at the weekly Briggs Sports Review of the Air broadcasts. Many celebrated baseball stars have been his recent guests before the microphone, and during the Winter hockey, football and other cold weather athletes visited him in the studios.

M., A. S. T.

The Time:—on the eve of the Palooka Sweepstakes, with the flowah of South betting on Kunnel McGillicuddy's "Equipoison", a nag from the Nawth, versus Massa O'Keefe's Black Beauty, a renovated ice-horse from the Knickerbocker stables.

The Place:—Moyountain Lodge, the Kunnel's plantation, suh, amid the bowahs and shadows of the Shaynadoah.

The People:—the flowah of the old South, suh, featurin' Missy Daisy Dandelion, played by Alice "Honey-lamb Potpie" Frost; Tayud Ha-using, a powahful boss dealer from up No'th; Master Jackson Ravenel O'Keefe as Gideon, the Smoky Mountain nit-wit; and Old Tom Pee Wee Hunt, from the Grayut Dismal Swamp.

New Film Singer To Be Heard As Bing Crosby's Guest

Mildred Stone, young California songstress who recently was signed to appear in several Hollywood pictures, will be guest singer on Bing Crosby's broadcast over the WABC-Columbia network on Tuesday, June 4, from 9:00 to 9:30 P. M., A. S. T.

After winning a Hollywood talent and beauty contest a year ago, Miss Stone was given a contract to sing over a California radio station. Subsequently she became the featured vocalist of Jimmie Grier's orchestra at the Biltmore Bowl. As a guest soloist at the Cocoanut Grove, Los Angeles, she won the favor of Mack Gordon, of the Gordon and Revel song-writing team. His interest led to the movie contract.

The musical program for the broadcast in which Crosby will serve as master-of-ceremonies and present his own songs, supported by Miss Stone and Georgie Stoll's orchestra, will be comprised of the following compositions: "St. Louis Blues", "Lady in Red", "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes", a wedding march medley, "Love Is the Sweetest Thing", "Wedding of the Painted Doll", "Honeymoon Hotel", and "She's a Latin from Manhattan".

Mighty sweet mountain music will be played by the Casa Loma lads, with Annette Hanshaw featuring "Seeing is Believing" and "What's the Reason?" Pee Wee Hunt will sing a favorite ballad, "Square Face", and Kenny Sargent will offer "You Saved My Life". An old favorite, "The Shiek", will be revived by the orchestra closing the program with "Wild Goose Chase".

Fed. Reserve Board Governor To Discuss "Sound Money"

Marriner C. Eccles, Governor of the Federal Reserve Board, will address the WABC-Columbia audience on Tuesday, June 4th, from 10:45 to 11:00 P. M., A. S. T. under the auspices of the Consumer's Committee of the National Advisory Council on Radio in Education.

For many years before taking over the Governorship of the Federal Reserve Board last November, Eccles had been a prominent banker and industrialist. He is a Republican and his home is in Ogden, Utah.

When Eccles discusses "The Consumer's Stake in Sound Money" on June 4, his talk will be the sixth in a series entitled "More for Your Money" which is being presented for the education of American consumers.
