

Mr. Orpen operates race tracks n Toronto and Windsor, and this year will conduct a meeting at Lonion, Ont. Best known of these enterprises is Dufferin track in Toonto, a half-miler known to the acing fraternity as "Little Saratoga."

Interested in horse racing for a good many years, Mr. Orpen once ran a handbook and owned horses himself. Finally he got into the race track business and retired from the owner class. He is of the opinion that a race track owner who runs his own horses at his own tracks is similar to a man attempting to win a prize at a bridge party in his own home. He quit racing horses in 1907-the year he had an entry in the King's Plate.


