

KENNETH WHITE DIED HERE EARLY THIS MORNING

Well Known Fredericton
Citizen was Respected
By All

Ill Only Few Days

Community Is Deeply
Grieved by Death of
Popular Citizen

The community was grieved to hear of the death of Kenneth C. White, which occurred this morning at five o'clock, at his home, 675 Charlotte Street. Deceased was 48 years old, and had been ill only a few days, having been taken sick with pneumonia on Friday, and his death comes as a distinct shock to his many relatives and friends in the city and elsewhere.

Mr. White had been manager of the Valley Motors for some years. He was president of the Fredericton Gyr Club and was a member of the Knights of Pythias Lodge. He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Stella McCatherine; one daughter Gloria; his mother, Mrs. Anna B. White, Los Angeles; one brother, Oty E. White, Florida; two sisters, Mrs. Jean Boyle, Los Angeles; and Mrs. Willard McKinley, of Arizona.

Mr. White was a son of the late Odour White, a former well known citizen, who was station agent here for the old Canada Eastern Railway.

The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon with service at the house at two o'clock. Rev. J. W. Bartlett will officiate and interment will take place at the Rural cemetery under the auspices of the Knights of Pythias.

SAINT ANDREW'S MEN ARE GUESTS OF ST. DUNSTAN'S MEN

Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross and
Male Members Were
Entertained

Fine Spirit Shown

Rev. Dr. Ross Delivered
Instructive Address;
Good Speeches

At St. Dunstan's Hall last evening the men of St. Dunstan's Roman Catholic congregation entertained Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross, and the men of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church. About a month or more ago the men of the Catholic church were guests of the men of St. Andrew's Presbyterian at St. Andrew's Church hall.

The affair last evening was a very pleasing one. Leo F. Cain presided and welcomed Rev. Dr. Ross, the speaker of the evening and the men of St. Andrew's congregation in a neat speech. He stated that Dr. Ross although only in this city a year or so has become known and respected in all classes of the community. Rev. Dr. J. H. Milligan, assistant priest at St. Dunstan's Church, also spoke and expressed his appreciation of the courtesies previously extended to St. Dunstan's church by the men of St. Andrew's. He said that he was one of the first to welcome Dr. Ross to this city, when he was present at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church on the occasion of the induction ceremony.

Father Milligan said that we all have a great asset in the city of Fredericton in a man such as Dr. Ross who, both as a citizen and a clergyman brings credit upon himself and upon his congregation. All citizens irrespective of creed have high regard for Rev. Dr. Ross. Speaking personally, Rev. Father Milligan said that he wished here to express his personal appreciation of extreme kindness shown to himself by Rev. Dr. Ross during his (Father Milligan) illness some months ago.

Rev. Dr. Ross in reply thanked Rev. Father Milligan for his words of appreciation and stated that the men of St. Andrew's congregation were pleased to be present. He referred to the friendship that existed between the two congregations which showed a splendid spirit of unity and Christian charity. Dr. Ross then delivered a very interesting talk dealing with conditions of life in British Guiana where he had spent three years as a Presbyterian missionary amongst the negroes and the East Indians. He dealt with the customs and life of the people and showed a number of views of schools, missions and the life in general in that country. At the conclusion of Dr. Ross's very interesting address a hearty vote of thanks was moved by J. P. Farrell seconded by Joseph Cain. The men of St. Dunstan's and their invited guests then went downstairs to the dining-room of the hall, where refreshments were served. A number of young men of the congregation acted as waiters. At the conclusion of the repast Edward Elliott, president of St. Andrew's Men's Club extended the thanks of the guests to the men of the congregation of St. Dunstan's. Mr. Elliott hoped that the fine example of friendship shown by these two societies would be taken up by other congregations. He said personally it did not make any difference to him when he reached the "pearly gates" whether the door was opened by St. Patrick or St. Andrew so long as he got inside.

J. B. McNair was called upon and delivered a very practical address interspersed with much humor. He said that men like Rev. Dr. Milligan of St. Dunstan's and Rev. Dr. Ross of St. Andrew's could do much in any community to cement a bond of fellowship

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Branch of the New Brunswick Fish and Game Association, was held last evening in the Council Chamber of the City Hall. There was a good attendance of interested members, with the President in the chair. The report of the president Wendell K. Hay, recommended another exhibit by the branch at the Fredericton Exhibition this year, also that steps be taken to investigate and consider the possibilities of friendly co-operation with the New Brunswick Guides Association. The treasurer, C. N. Goodspeed, reported a total expenditure of about \$500.00 for the year. The balance in the treasury is \$16.20. Allen Menzies, Chairman of the Fish Stocking Committee, reported a total distribution of nearly 500,000 trout and salmon fry in the County of York. The chairman of the Rearing Pond Committee, Edward Hagerman, advised keeping the pond at Baker Brook for experimental purposes. Trout were raised to a length of four inches last season. H. C. Moore, for the

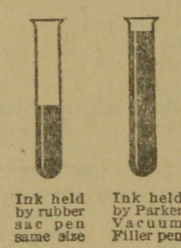
