New Brunswick Nurse Organized The Canadian Branches Of The Order.

Miss Beatrice de Veber of Waltham, is the guest of her sister, Mrs. G. Herbert Lee. Miss de Veber is superintendent of the Waltham Training School for Nurses which position she has held for several years. It is of interest to note that Miss de Veber was successor to Miss Charlotte MacLeod who resigned her position to come to Canada in order to found the Victorian Order of Nurses, which owes its origin to the organization of district nursing in force at the Waltham Training School for Nurses in the late nineties. Lord Aberdeen, when he was Governor General of Canada and Lady Aberdeen were the promoters of the Order in Canada. In order to acquaint themselves with the work and details of the organization Lord and Lady Aberdeen spent several weeks in Waltham as the guests of Dr. Worcester, who was dean of the faculty of the School. On the invitation of Lady Aberdeen, Miss MacLeod who is a native of Sussex, N. B., came to Canada and established branches of the Order from coast to coast in the Dominion. Miss MacLeod had been persuaded to study nursing some years previously by Mrs. Medley, wife of Bishop Medley whom she had met in Sussex while the latter was visiting her son Canon Medley. Mrs. Medley had studied nursing herself under Florence Nightingale and was a constant correspondent with the famous nurse.

RELEASES ROAD  
CONTRACTS

Seven Units of Trans-Canada Highway to Cost \$2,500,000.

TORONTO, July 10 — Seven contracts for Trans-Canada Highway construction at an estimated cost of \$2,572,573 were let yesterday by Hon. Peter Heenan, Ontario Minister of Northern Development, in conjunction with officials of the Dominion Government which will pay half the price.

The contracts cover the 105 mile stretch from White River to Schreiber and the 60 mile stretch from Dymont to Vermilion Bay in Northwestern Ontario.

Work, scheduled to start immediately, will be provided for 7,000 men, the Minister said. The labor will be recruited by the Provincial Department of Labor and Municipal Councils.

Camps to house the workers are being built by the gov't, and they must be uniform and conform to high sanitary standards.

The White River-Schreiber stretch was divided into five units of 21 miles each. The Dominion Construction Company and McNamara Construction Company, of Toronto were each awarded two contracts and the other went to the Hewitson Construction Company of Port Arthur.

Dufferin Construction Company of Toronto received contracts for the two 30 mile units on the Dymont-Vermilion Bay stretch.

The Minister declined to reveal the price of the contracts but said the companies were the lowest tenders.

"What I'm pleased about in the whole thing is that it justifies my estimate and position all the way through that it would not be as expensive a job as reported by those opposed to it," said Mr. Heenan.

After the work has been completed on the White River-Schreiber section, the Department will still have to decide what type of surface will be placed on the road. Tenders closed yesterday on the contract for work on the road from English River to Port William, a distance of 15 miles.

MOVE OLD LIGHT-  
HOUSE MAKE IT  
A HOSPITAL

Building Was Hauled Across Ice by Residents of Port Saunders.

PORT SAUNDERS, Newfoundland, July 10—A lighthouse erected several years ago to save human lives from destruction on the rocky coast of Keppel Island, is being turned into a hospital at Port Saunders.

Situated at the mouth of Hawkes Bay, the building was a lighthouse and dwelling-place for the light keeper until the department of natural resources substituted an automatic light in its place.

Nurse Woolridge was appointed to Port Saunders last fall by the department of public health and welfare and she determined to attempt to put the building to a useful purpose.

Bryant Harding of Bonne Bay donated a site for the hospital at Port Saunders and Nurse Woolridge organized the residents, had them haul the lighthouse across the ice during the winter and even construct a foundation for the proposed building.

The department of public health and welfare is sending full equipment for the hospital.

CHURCH FEELING  
IS HIGH IN  
GERMANY

BERLIN July 10—Feeling ran high last evening in the controversy between Nazi party leaders and the Catholic Church when it was learned that a church in Borken, a little town in Westphalia, had been desecrated by vandals.

Another development was an official bulletin sent out yesterday by Dr. Wilhelm Frick, minister of interior, warning Catholics not to expect special immunity from the sterilization law and warning of imprisonment for anyone who fought it.

Meanwhile Westphalian Catholics sought to get at the bottom of the raid of the Borken Church, during which vandals set fire to the altar and desecrated the place of worship.

Witnesses asserted they had seen Nazi storm troopers enter the church shortly before the vandalism was discovered. An official police statement yesterday, however, said that a man named Mensing, a devout Catholic and a member of the St. Cecile Parish had confessed after a long period of stubborn denial that he had set the fire.

CARRIED HALF  
MILE BY SASK.  
TORNADO

Victim Succumbs to Injuries Bringing Storm Deaths to Three.

WINNIPEG, July 10—A third death was caused in Western Canada today from storms that wracked the country over the weekend, bringing the total storm dead in the past week to six. Three were killed in storms over the Dominion day weekend.

Latest fatality was the death of Gilbert Korstadt, 40, in hospital at Dodsland, Sask. He was fatally injured when a tornado picked up the farm home of Oille Svien, 30, near Sniley, Sask., and carried it half a mile. Svien was instantly killed. An unidentified miner drowned in a cloudburst at Willow Creek, Alta.

The work of rehabilitation went on apace. Railroad crews worked to restore tracks washed out by rain and hail storms in Saskatchewan and the farmers sought to check their crop damage. As yet there has been no reliable estimate, but it will run into thousands of dollars.

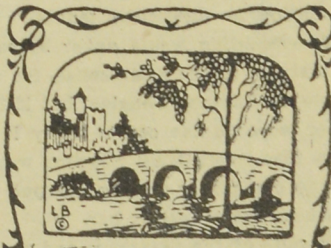
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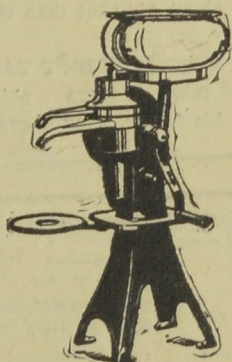
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
