## DREYFUS

Alfred Dreyfus was one of those rare persons whose lot it is to become a legend while they live. For some the destiny is a happy one. For others it is a tragic fortune. The Dreyfus case wrote into history one of the world's most touching human documents. It turned out in the end a shameful indictment of military bureaucracy. It stands today a timely warning to an age inclined to lessen the democratic emphasis on the sacredness of individual rights before the law.

Young Captain Dreyfus was arrested on suspicion of treason in 1894. At an illegally conducted trial he was sentenced to life imprisonment on what since has become known as Devil's Island. His disgrace had severe social and economic consequences for his family and relatives. Evidence that might have freed him went unexamined. Men who might have saved him remained silent. Years later his innocence was established. He was restored to the army with honors. After his retirement he volunteered his services to aid France in the World War and commanded one of the Paris forts.

The Dreyfus case is too long to detail here. But some explanation of his persecution can be offered. Dreyfus was the first Jewish officer to achieve the distinction of connection with the general staff. It is widely conceded today that an element of anti-Semitism played a part in his arraignment. His conviction may also have been a convenient cover for some-one else's guilt.

The whole tragic and shameful episode was possible because of two factors in its disposition. One was racial prejudice. The other was tolerance of something less than strict legality on the part of those entrusted with the case. Both these influences are pressing on the public concept of justice today. Their too probable effects on perfectly innocent people are well illustrated in the life of Alfred Dreyfus.

## PUBLIC WORKS IN BRITAIN

The decision of the British Government to guarantee the expenditure of £40,000,000 on London transport shows a new direction in policy, involving a very interesting experiment.

The Government has been pressed again and again to embark on a big program of public works to stimulate trade and absorb the unemployed. Except in the case of the support given to the big Cunard liners, it has generally resisted this demand. Its attitude as expressed by Mr. Chamberlain, has been that a sound general policy was more beneficial to trade than direct intervention in industry.

But many of its most stalwart supporters are not satisfied. The latter have pointed out that sound finance has produced cheap money, and that the moment when money is cheap is the right one to choose for investing in important development work. Mr. Lloyd George is in the vanguard of this movement, and has presented to the Cabinet a comprehensive program

of public works which might be undertaken on a large scale.

It is already apparent that the Government will not accept Mr. Lloyd George's program in its entirety. But it is equally clear that it is impressed by the public feeling created, and that it will unbend to the extent of adopting some similar if lesser schemes. Mr. Chamberlain's latest plan is one of them.

The need for improving the systems of electrified suburban railways to the north and east of London has long been urgently felt. The lack of adequate transport in these regions had become a serious grievance, and the railway authorities had only been deterred from undertaking new construction on their own credit by the enormous capital outlay it would involve. But the Government guarantee will give cheap capital. The money invested will earn its dividends. Work which will give employment to thousands of persons, including those in the distressed areas, will be provided; and London will be rendered permanently better off.

The investment, of course, may be described as a socialist enterprise. But it is of a novel kind. The Government will not perform the work itself, nor will it set up a new public corporation to do it. It will create by statute a company which will raise the money, guaranteed by the State, from public subscription; and it will invest this money in existing undertakings, namely, the London Passenger Transport Board and two main-line railway companies; the capital is to be repaid within twenty-five years.

The experiment will be of the greatest importance. The lessons learned from it will be applicable to other undertakings. It is not likely to be the last. Already several comparable schemes are being pressed upon the Government's attention.

## INDUSTRY MANAGERS HEAR DUKE OF KENT

London, July 17. — The Duke of Kent, the King's youngest son, substituted for his brother, the Prince of Wales, today to open the sixth international congress for scientific management.

He told representatives of 34 nations: "The industrial future of every country is closely bound up with the recognition of the importance of the management factor. I am sure you will not overlook the fact that behind it all is the human being."

Two thousand delegates congregated, claiming a record for size of a business congress and for procedure—no speeches and no resolutions.

More than 1,000,000 words in 200 papers will be read, however, in the congress which continues until July 20 in Westminster central hall for exchange of views on development of business management.

## N. B. Dairy Products Commission Regulations

According to this week's Royal Gazette the Dairy Products Commission has enacted that the section in the Act relating to the sale of sweet cream in the Fredericton area be cancelled. The Commission has announced that on and after August 1, sweet cream sold in the Fredericton area shall be known as whipping cream, minimum 34 per cent butterfat, the minimum prices for which shall be as follows: Quarts—retail, 50 cents, wholesale, 45 cents; pints—retail, 28 cents, wholesale 25 cents; half pints—retail 15, wholesale 13 cents.

This week's issue of the Gazette also gives notice that "any milk or cream purchased from producer suppliers outside the areas defined by the Dairy Products Commission for delivery or resale in any such area shall be paid for on the area in which such milk or cream is to be sold". The Gazette also gives notice that the Dairy Products Act becomes effective in the Sackville area, commencing on August 1, also in the Woodstock area on the same date.

The Marysville area including the town of Marysville also has been established under the Dairy Products Act becoming effective on August 1.

## COUNCILLOR RESIGNS

It is learned by the Daily Mail today that William T. Griffin of Boiestown, last week tendered his resignation to County Secretary Treasurer Major J. S. Scott, as York county councillor for the parish of Stanley, which he has represented for the past ten years. The reason for his resignation is that he has removed from the parish and is now living in Boiestown. "Bill" Griffin is well known in the province for his guiding activities, and is president of the New Brunswick Guides Association. His departure from the Council will be regretted and he will be greatly missed.

## ALBERTA ELECTION SET FOR AUG. 22

Edmonton, July 17. — All parties are preparing for what promises to be one of the most keenly fought campaigns in years following official announcement today Alberta provincial elections will be held Thursday, Aug. 22, with nomination day Aug. 12.

Announcement of polling date was made by Hon. George Hoadley, acting premier, in the absence of Premier R. G. Reid, leader of United Farmers of Alberta forces, which party has held power for 14 years.

All political parties, including the newly-formed Aberhart Social Credit party, have been holding nominating conventions during the past few weeks and it is expected more than 200 candidates will be in the running for the 63 seats in the Legislature.
